HOUSE WAS STRUCK.

During the electrical storm on Wednesday evening, lightning struck the house owned by Mr. Ira Howe, on St. Patrick-st. Very little damage was done, only a small hole being made in the roof.

Mr. Howe thinks that the lightning went out through the stove in the kitchen.

LEFT FOR REGINA.

Miss Louise Hadder, daughter of Mr. Thomas Hadder, east ward, who has been engaged as a stenographer with McLaughlin, Peel & Fuiton's law firm, left Thursday for Regina, Sask., where she has secured a position. Miss Hadder has been living in town practically all her life, and has formed a large circle of friends.

LICENSE OUT OFF.

There is but one hotel at Port Perry at present. The License Commissioners of South Ontario met recently and the St. Charles hotel kept by E. Allward was refused a license.

Mr. Allward was given three months to sell out, and the owner of the premises was notified that if within the three months the house was repaired and put into a thorough sanitary condition, the house, though not the present lessee, might be granted a license. The repairs must be to the satisfaction of the commissioners.

REV. TENEY IS NOW RECTOR.

Rev. J. H. Teney, rector of the township of Emily and the town of Omamee, Victoria county, has been appointed by Bishop Sweeney to the rectorship of St. Philip's Anglican church, Toronto, left vacant by the elevation of the former rector to be bishop of Toronto. A recommendation was made by the vestry of the church last Monday night, mentioning the names of Rev. Canon Starr of Kingston and Rev. Mr. Teney in connection with the appointment.

The new rector of St. Philip's, who is well known in Lindsay, is forty-three years of age, and prior to entering the ministry of the Anglican church was a school teacher. His ordination took place in Toronto fifteen years ago, and prior to taking his present charge was at Craighurst. With his present congregation and the clergy in general Rev. Mr. Teney is very popular. He is eminently fitted for the rectorship of the Toronto church to which he has just been appointed. He is an able preacher, and in his work for the church in order to get in touch with his congregation never spares himself. Rev. Mr. Teney will go to Toronto about the beginning of July.

BARN STRUCK.

Lightning struck the barn of Owen Traynor, on the south half of lot 16, con 5, Thursday and it was completely destroyed. The bolt set fire to the frame structure in many places and in a short time it was a mass of flames.

A threshing machine belonging to his son Joseph, 15 tons of hay and about four hundred bushels of oats were consumed in the fire, and the total damage is about \$1500. The insurance on the barn was \$500 and there was no insurance on the other property destroyed.

The lightning bolt which caused the fire struck the barn about eight o'clock last evening, just when the storm commenced and the lightning was the fiercest. The barn was located on a farm close by where Mr. Traynor lived and the house had no occupant. When the fire was first noticed the frame structure was wrapped in flames and to save anything was impossible.

The flames cast a bright glow over the sky, which could be seen for miles. The barn is located near Ops station on the C.P.R. Mr. Traynor is particularly unfortunate as this is the second barn he has lost within the past five years. His other barn was burned with all his summer crop in it and the loss was considerable. It was set on fire while threshing. The sympathy of the entire community is extended to Mr. Traynor in his great loss.

OBITUARY

THOS. GIFFORD:

The death occurred on Friday of Thos Gifford, of Pontypool, a former highly respected citizen of this town. The late Mr. Gifford was 45 years of age and was ill only twenty-four hours. He was a resident of Lindsay for many years and worked for Mr. John Williamson as a harness-maker. He was a brother-in-law of Mr. T. A. Fisher. The remains will arrive in town on Monday and the funeral will be held from his father-in-law's, Mr. Peter Fisher, Glenelg-st., in the afternoon. The funeral will be in charge of the Canadian Order of Oddfellows, of which society deceased was a prominent member for many years. The deceased leaves to mourn his loss besides a loving wife, three girls and one boy.

MRS. W. RAE.

The death of the late Mrs. W. Rae took place on Friday in Toronto. Deceased lived in Lindsay for about a year and a half and also lived in Reahoro for some years. Four sons are living, three in Toronto and one in St. Louis. Sheridan Rae, who formerly conducted a livery stable in this town, is one of the sons of the deceased. Mrs. Reynolds, Toronto, was a sister, and Tupper Rae, St. Louis, a brother. Mr. George Rae, of town, is a relative. The funeral will take place on Monday morning to the Riverside cemetery on arrival of the C.P.R. train from Toronto.

JUDGMENT RESERVED.

Because the agent did not notify the head office about certain defects in a seed drill he had pointed out, J. J. Hill, of Cannington, refused to pay for the machine and the case came up in division court before Judge Harding.

TO PATROL TRENT WATERS.

During the next week the Ontario Government will put the Str. "Maga" in the Trent waters to protect the fish by preventing illegal methods in fishing.

The Str. "Maga" will make a fine addition to the already large Trent fleet. It will patrol the entire Trent waterway from Lake Simcoe to Healey's Falls. The boat is sixty feet long, trim and fast and has been doing duty on the Bay of Quinte. The "Maga" will be launched in Peterboro, which city will be its headquarters. The captain of the boat has not been announced as yet.

COMMUNION CARD OF 1897.

An interesting curio is in the possession of Mr. R. G. McCraw, town. It is a metal token used in the olden days in the Presbyterian church for the same purpose as communion cards are used in that church now.

The token is oval in shape and is of copper. On one side is the name of the church with the date as follows:

"Ferrol Church, 1897."

On the opposite side is engraved: "1st Corinthians, 9, 24-29."

On an examination of the New Testament, strange to say, there are not 29 verses in that chapter. The interesting relic was in the possession of an aunt of Mr. McCraw's, who attended Ferrol church in Scotland.
