Did Mr. Fielding say that? Possibly he did, but he certainly did not insist upon it. He meekly yielded to President Taft, made a number of reductions in the Canadian tariff and did not get a single reduction in the American tariff in return.

DRAINAGE AND GOOD ROADS

The Toronto World of the 2nd inst. prints a commendable article on "Ontario's Problems," extracts from which are given below:

The long spell of rainy weather—now three weeks—finds the country watersoaked, save and except where tile drains have been laid. There is more greenness than growth in sight.

is the greatest drawback in this Ontario of ours to-day. It costs our people more money in poor crops and more discomfort than anything else.

The test of this Ontario is its ability to maintain its people in comfort and in a physical condition to reproduce themselves.

Let us get it into our heads that Ontario needs drainage and good roads more than anything else, if she is to be great and her people happy.

Yes, nature is severe in these parts, whether it be rain or winter snow or shine. Drainage of the farm lands and drainage of the roads means good crops and getting about made easier.

THE CRIME WAVE

During the past couple of weeks The Watchman has twice referred to the fact that crime appears to be on the increase.

Ontario at one time took a pride in the comparative freedom from serious crime that the province enjoyed. Of late, however, the record has been sadly blurred.

The results of the spring assize courts in Ontario have been extraordinary. At North Bay there were three murder trials with one conviction for murder, one for manslaughter, and one of assault with intent, and deoite the strong judicial charges to the jury in all the cases.

Near Guelph, drink was responsible for a wife-murder and suicide. At Cobourg, an Italian who shot two compatriots in a drunken fight was adjudged guilty only of manslaughter.

Next week a young man will be tried for his life on a charge of having poisoned his wife and two children. A man of 70 will be tried for his life in eastern Ontario for the alleged deliberate shooting of a man of 76.

Smith's Falls, a laborer deliberately choked his wife to death, while in a railway construction camp just east of this city, an 18-year-old Italian perhaps fatally stabbed another.

This is a terrible list of deeds of violence. The majority were the result of passion, with a too handy instrument of death. Stricter regulation of the sale of weapons might have prevented some.
