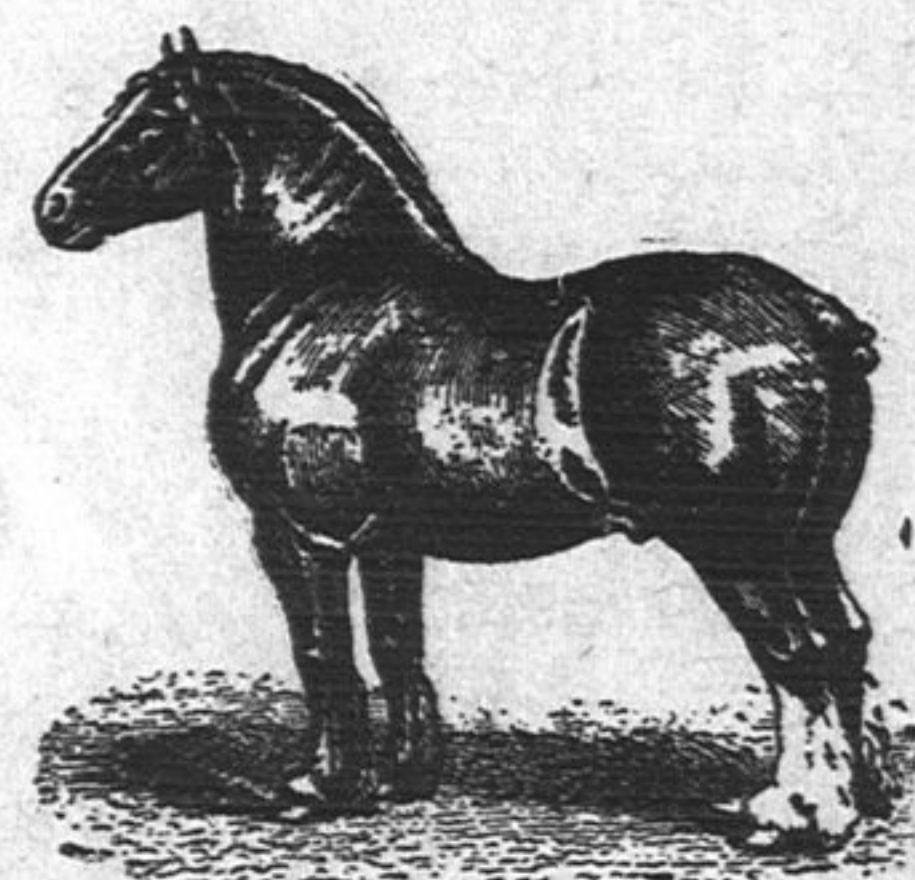

Mr. Vic Suggitt spent Sunday at his home here.

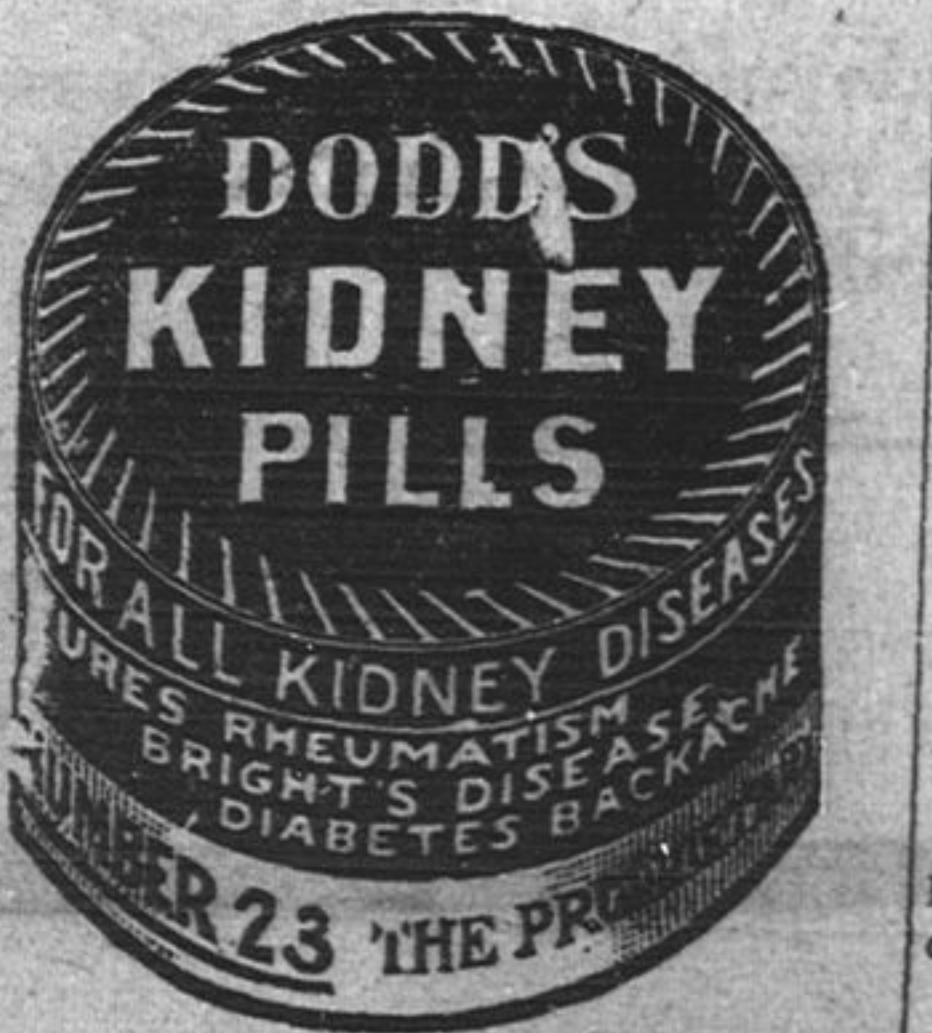
Mrs. Wesley Jewel is under the doctor's care at present.
