The Case of the Man Who Awaits Execution at Whitby
 (Toronto Star.)

In passing sentence of death on Archie McLaughlin at Whitby, for the killing of his wife at Uxbridge last autumn, the judge declared that this crime impressed him as the most cold-blooded within his experience. And most of those who are familiar with the case will entirely agree with the words spoken from the bench. It is impossible to entertain a doubt as to the man's guilt. He was tried and convicted of slaying his wife, but it is almost equally certain that he made away with his two young sons at the same time, and tried to cover his crimes by setting fire to the house. What he did not expect—and there is always something that a murderer overlooks—was that three or four people returning home late from a party should see smoke issuing from his house, and come to the scene before he was ready to call in the public. He was interrupted—he was not ready to act his part, and acted it badly.

The man seems to have gone about the business of murder as lightly as if he had been killing a chicken. He did not even stoop to the use of cunning in securing the poison which he used. He got it down at the corner and used it forthwith.

But in reading the evidence given at the coroner's inquest and at the trial held in Whitby, the fault was strikingly brought out that in these times there is a great deal of flabby moral character displayed by men who think well of themselves. But the curious, the discouraging feature of the whole case, came out in evidence when one witness after another told of conversations with McLaughlin, in which he defamed a young woman, talked of eloping with her, and of deserting his wife and children. He talked about a young woman, saying things which, if untrue, made him out a slanderous liar, and which, if true, made him out a hound. Yet none of those to whom he spoke seemed to feel that it was the duty of a right-minded person to tell him that he deserved to be kicked the length of the main street. Instead of being discouraged, he seems to have been encouraged in the belief that he was a duce of a fellow. But he moved, as he supposed, amid the applause of his fellows, and was something of a bar-room hero until he tried his hand at murder, and made a bungler of it.

If anybody in Uxbridge had knocked McLaughlin down when first he deserved that treatment, there might have been no occasion for a hanging in Whitby jail on the 18th of July.

There is another feature of this and similar cases worth considering, and that is the practice of making a criminal trial a public spectacle. People come from near and far to crowd into the court room, and sit for hours in a place where the air they breathed was as bad as the moral atmosphere in which they were enveloped. People dearly love to be horrified. They like to feed their eyes on the countenance of a monster. They like to agitate their imaginations by picturing the scenes described, fitting the prisoner as they see him into the tragedy as the story of it is unfolded. They like to watch the face of the doomed man to see whether any tell-tale emotions flit across it.

It is not necessary, however, to argue that all those who crowd to these murder trials are people of inferior intelligence. They are average people, no doubt, but of this we

BLAMES MR. TODD
VERDICT IN DEATH OF LITTLE BAILEY BOY.
 Peterboro, May 21.—The jury in the inquest on the death of James A. Bailey, a child of five years, who died under Christian Science treatment, no physician being called, returned a verdict to the effect that the child died of natural causes. The parents were exonerated of intentional neglect, as the jury thought they were under the influence of R. J. Todd, Christian Science reader, who led them to believe that he could heal the child by prayer. The verdict concluded: "We recommend the passing of a law that would punish such men as Mr. Todd." The latter was the principal witness at the last sitting of the jury. He had special prayers for each disease. Before he saw the child he gave him prayer treatment for symptoms as told him. On discovering the presence of the abscess, he applied the prayer treatment for abscesses, which he claimed to be able to treat better than the doctors. He said his power was interfered with by his desire to call a doctor to get a surgical certificate. He got money for his treatment, which he did not give unless he got it.

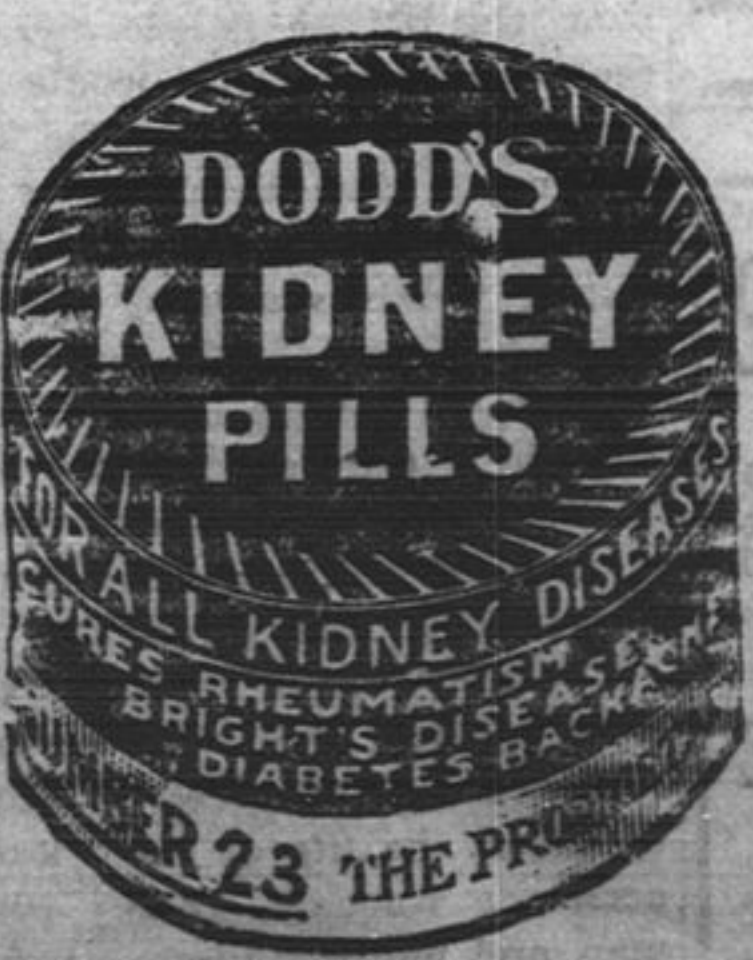
