Orchard Demonstration Work in this County

A first-class article is not produced by accident, but it is the result of care and attention from start to finish. The orchard must be properly pruned and cultivated and sprayed. Those who give their plantations attention usually stop with pruning and cultivation, leaving injurious fungi and insects to work their ravages unchecked. The result is that the fruit is nearly always more or less scabby and wormy.

This neglect of spraying is due largely to the fact that the average farmer is unfamiliar with spraying apparatus, and dubious of the benefits of spraying. He is therefore wary of investing money in a scheme which to him seems doubtful of giving an adequate return.

In order to demonstrate what thorough, systematic spraying will do for an orchard, the district branch of the Ontario Department of Agriculture at Lindsay is doing some work in this direction, and experiments in spraying are being carried out in the orchards of the following men: Messrs. Isaac Deyell, Lindsay; Norman Gillis, Cambray; Wm. Cullis and Jas. Fell, Powles' Corners; John McNevin, Reaboro; Jas. Moore and Jos. Hickson, Mt. Horeb; J. F. Dix, Little Britain; and Jas. Swain, Valentia.

About a dozen apple trees, representing the varieties most subject to scab and apple worm, were selected in each orchard, as well as several pear trees where they were to be had.

These trees will be sprayed three times during the season, using the lime-sulphur compound as fungicide, and arsenate of lead as an insecticide. The first spraying, just before the blossoms open, is already done, and the second will be applied just after the blossoms fall. The third and last application will be made about two weeks after the second. In the large commercial orchards these three applications effectually control injurious fungi and insects giving a clean, sound sample of fruit.

It is hoped that owners of orchards will avail themselves of the opportunity to note the benefits of thorough spraying by watching the results in the nearest orchard in which the experiments are being carried on.

Issue to be Tried in Marriage Case

In the list of Osgoode Hall cases appears the following case from Midland, which was heard before Justice Riddell:

Fraser v. Robertson.—Motion by defendant under C.R. 261, to dismiss action as frivolous and vexatious. Judgment: This action is, I am informed, wholly without precedent. The plaintiff, Michael Fraser, is an old retired farmer, over 80 years of age (84, it is said); the defendants are a lady about 30, with whom, it is said, he went through a ceremony of marriage on January 13, 1910, and her father, a retired Presbyterian minister of experience as an editor. Catherine McCormick, alleging that the plaintiff was unsound mind, brought action with herself (daughter of his cousin german), as next friend, charging the defendants with conspiracy and forcing an entrance into the plaintiff's house, etc. I do not intend here to pass upon the sanity of the plaintiff. It would seem that where a plaintiff denies and the next friend asserts mental incapacity, the action will not be allowed to proceed without a judicial inquiry of some kind into such mental capacity of the plaintiff. Instead of sending the inquiry to be otherwise made, I shall direct an issue to be tried before myself at Toronto, June 5, 1910, in which issue the next friend shall be plaintiff, and the plaintiff and defendants, and the issues to be tried: (1) Whether Michael Fraser was, on Saturday, May 14, 1910, incompetent to retain solicitors to make a motion to dismiss the action; (2) whether the said Michael Fraser, on January 17, 1910, was of unsound mind and incapable of managing himself or his affairs, and (3) whether the said Michael Fraser is, on the day of the trial, of unsound mind and incapable of managing himself or his affairs. The plaintiff may be examined by Dr. J. Bruce Smith, and, if plaintiff desires, in presence of Dr. Clarke or such other medical man

as the plaintiff may name. The official guardian will represent the plaintiff. Action stayed until trial of the issues. Motion retained until further order. Costs reserved. If parties prefer, they may have the statutory inquiry.

OBITUARY

EMMA PARKER BRYAN.

The angel of death claimed another one of Lindsay's respected residents on Monday, May 16, in the person of Emma Parker Bryan, aged 76 years, and relic of the late Geo. Bryans. The deceased lady was born in Wolverhampton, England, and was a daughter of the late Richard Parker. She was united in marriage to the late George Bryan in 1855, and three years later the young couple sailed for Canada. They first located at Port Hope, where they spent four years, and then moved to Lindsay, where they made their permanent home.

The late Mrs. Bryan has been confined to her bed about eight weeks but she bore her suffering with Christian resignation. She is survived by five daughters and one son—Elizabeth, wife of Mr. Wm. Timms; Fanny, wife of Mr. Chas. Jackson; Mary Emma, wife of Mr. Ernie Von Axelson, Florida; Charlotte Ann, wife of Richard Parker; Mr. Henry Bryan, of the Flavelle Milling Co. staff, is the only surviving son.

In religion the late Mrs. Bryan was a Methodist. She was a kind and loving mother and a good neighbor, and her demise will be regretted by a host of friends.

The funeral will take place on Wednesday afternoon from her late residence, Queen-st., to Riverside cemetery, at 2 o'clock. Service at the house before the funeral will be conducted by Rev. Mr. Real, of Queen-st. Methodist church.

THOMAS FOWLER.

After a sojourn of sixty years on this earth Thomas Fowler, a most respected resident of Lindsay, departed this life this morning at the family residence, corner of York and Kent-sts. The deceased gentleman has been ailing during the last four months and gradually grew worse until the end came. He was born in Ireland and came to Canada with his parents when a lad eight years of age, settling in the township of Manvers. Here he followed the occupation of a carpenter and builder for a number of years, moving to Lindsay some twenty-one years ago. He was a staunch Conservative and a member of the Methodist church.

A devoted wife, two sons and one brother are left to mourn his loss. Mrs. Fowler and Messrs. George and Edward Fowler live at home, and the brother, Mr. James Fowler, lives in Peterboro.

The funeral will take place at Bethany on the arrival of the seven a.m. Grand Trunk train from Lindsay, Monday, interment to take place in Graham's cemetery.

MRS. A. D. MALLON.

The funeral of the late Mrs. A. D. Mallon was held this morning from her late home, King-st., and was largely attended by friends, citizens and relatives. The remains were conveyed to St. Mary's church, where requiem high mass was celebrated by Archdeacon Casey, and thence to the R. C. cemetery, where the remains were interred.
