Guard of Sovereigns Followed the Remains

London, May 20.-London never seemed to be so crowded and never so still as on this day, when the remains of Edward VII. were removed and born away on a gun carriage, with its glittering body guard of sovereigns, to Paddington station. The amazing color of the scene was made the more vivid by the fact that the day was a perfect English

The actual removal of the body was a simple and pathetic ceremony. When the mourners arrived from Buckingham Palace the coffin rested on the catafalque in minster Hall, surrounded by guard of Ancient Yeomen, and with the Archbishop of Canterbury one other cleric praying quietly its side. The Queen-mother, a slight and wondrously youthful figure, dressed in black and wearing the ribbon of the Garter, went into the Hall with her second daughter, Princess Victoria, King George, the Kaiser, and the Duke of Connaught. After a few minutes of quiet prayer, the coffin was brought out by sergeants of the Grenadier Guards, preceded by a clergyman bearing a gilt cross. Then followed a moving spectacle as the bodyguard of kings wheeled round the Palace yard and passed Queen Alexandra's carriage, three by three, reverently saluting her as they passed.

LAST RESPECTS TO THE DEAD. Perhaps the most dramatic incident of the chapel ceremony after the Garter King had proclaimed "styles" of the dead King was the farewell procession past the open grave. The Queen-mother had stopped, lingering, despite King George's gentle pressure, but was finally persuaded to turn away. Then the Kaiser, grim and stern, with grey face, bent his knee at the tomb his uncle. One after another of the Sovereigns of Europe paused beside was entombed in the Albert Memorthe opening in the chapel floor through which the coffin had been silently lowered a few minutes before, and made a low bow in



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
