The Ross Rifles are Unequaled

From the official government report of the proceedings of parliament at Ottawa on Monday, April 24, the following item is clipped: Col. Sam. Hughes, M.P., for Victoria and Halifax: "I desire to ask a question of the Minister of Militia and Defence (Sir Frederick Borden). I have a clipping taken from 'Arms and Explosives,' dated April, 1911. This is a magazine dealing with rifles and military information generally. The item is headed 'Obituary of Lee-Enfield,' and the statement is: 'In introducing the army estimates, Mr. Haldane stated the question of a new rifle is under careful consideration, and that as soon as a pattern had been determined upon it would be subjected to test and experiment. Captain Gourthepe asked whether reference was made to a magazine or an automatic rifle, and Mr. Haldane replied: 'A magazine rifle is years away yet, and if we waited for it, I fear we should have to wait a very long time.'"

"I desire to ask the Minister of Militia and Defence, in view of the great success which has attended the Ross Rifle, whether it is his intention to draw the attention of the British government to the fact that the Canadian Ross rifle is now regarded as unequalled in any country in the world."

Sir Frederick Borden—I think I could scarcely venture to go so far as that. But if my opinion were asked by the Minister of War in England, I should be glad to express my entire satisfaction with the work done by the Ross rifle.

200 GALLONS SYRUP.

Mr. Brodie's syrup industry at Still Lake, is closed down. He made over 200 gallons of syrup, but unfortunately he gathered in his buckets too soon, for there was a dandy run afterwards. However, as it was, with the 1800 tons tapped it kept two men and a team pumping, and then a lot of sap was lost. Mr. Brodie and an assistant looked after the evaporator. A lot of syrup was sold in Bobcaygeon and the balance was shipped. The price was about \$1.85 per gallon.
