\$60,000 IN PRIZES

CANADIAN NATIONAL EXHIBITION PRIZE LIST FOR 1911 IS OUT.

The prize list of the Canadian National Exhibition, August 26th to September 11th, which is being distributed, shows that the prizes have been increased in nearly every department, till the grand total reaches \$60,000.

As no prizes are given for manufactures, the whole of this amount goes to stock, dairy products, horticulture, woman's work, educational exhibits, and similar lines of Canadian Industry.

The increase in the amount given to live stock is particularly noticeable. Nearly \$5,000 has been added to the horses' share, while special prizes of \$500 each for the best animal in the Holstein and Shorthorn classes, show that the cattle have not been neglected. Poultry also gets an additional \$1,000.

In women's and children's work and educational exhibits new classes have been added, and in short every department shows the exhibition is keeping pace with its wonderful increase in attendance.

Suing the Town For Loss of Horse
