Horses

The stallion which stands for a low fee is, as a general thing, dear at any price.

The time to feed for weight is when the colt is young. Greater gains are always made while the animal is going.

The model draft horse should show a vigorous, lively, energetic disposition, yet be docile, tractable and intelligent.

The drafter is called upon to do most of his work at the walk. It is most important, therefore, that he be able to walk fast.

The cost of raising the right kind of colt, as compared with that required in producing the scrub, is the same, but selling time shows a vast difference in values in favor of the colt from the good sire and dam.

The foal from unsound sire or dam may be sound when foaled, but such animals very often inherit a predisposition to the disease of unsoundness with which the parents are affected.

Feet and legs are perhaps the most important parts of the horse, and at the same time the most likely to be affected with unsoundness.

FEW CHANGES IN QUEBEC

Very Little Interest and a Small Vote

Montreal, May 15. — The Quebec provincial elections to-day resulted in the return of the Gouin Government by an increased majority over that which it had in the last House.

The standing of the parties according to the latest returns is — Liberals 61, Opposition 16, Labor 2, To be held 2.

But little interest was manifested in the elections, the indifference amounting to apathy in the British districts of Montreal. The Government appealed to the people on its record, while the Opposition charged it with extravagance, citing the erection of a \$8,000,000 jail and a \$600,000 Technical school in Montreal as examples.

SEVEN-MILE RESORT. Mr. Mills, who has the contract for the erection of Delmont cottage, on Seven-Mile Island for a summer resort, is rushing the work to completion, and will have it ready for opening by the 1st of June says the Port Perry Observer.

SUNDAY SCHOOL.

Lesson VIII.—Second Quarter, For May 26, 1912.

THE INTERNATIONAL SERIES.

Text of the Lesson, Matt. v, 33-37; Jas. iii, 1-12; v, 12—Memory Verses, 34-35—Golden Text, Eph. iv, 25, R. V. Commentary Prepared by Rev. D. M. Stearns.

The topic of today's lesson is "Truthfulness" but from the first and last Scripture selections it would seem to be a warning against swearing or, taking the three passages, a lesson on the control of the tongue. The essential thing is a right relation to God, who is the God of truth (Isa. xlv, 16), whose throne is heaven, His footstool the earth and Jerusalem His special city, the city of the great King. That title makes us think of Mal. i, 12-14, where He complains of the deceit of His people in bringing Him offerings they would not bring to an earthly ruler, and he said, "I am a great King, . . . and my name is dreadful among the nations." In Mal. ii, 1, 2, He said that there would be a curse if they did not lay it to heart to give glory to His name. Sometimes men are so honored by others that it is said of such a one, "That man's word is as good as his bond." How much more should the word of God suffice as the firmest possible foundation on which to rest. "Forever, O Lord, thy word is settled in heaven." "Hath He said and shall He not do it?" "The Lord of Hosts hath sworn, saying, Surely as I have thought so shall it come to pass, and as I have purposed so shall it stand" (Ps. cxix, 89; Num. xxiii, 19; Isa. xiv, 24). The more we meditate upon Him the more we shall become like Him in word and deed. Beholding as in a glass the glory of the Lord, we shall be changed into the same image from glory to glory by the Spirit of the Lord (II Cor. iii, 18) and thus be more manifestly children of our Father who is in heaven.

WIRELESS TELEPHONY

VOICE HEARD DISTINCTLY 160 MILES AWAY.

London, May 15.—A despatch to the Times from Rome says that for about a year the Italian naval and military authorities have been carrying on experiments in wireless telephony. A month ago a message was sent from the wireless station on Monte Mario to the Island of Ponza, a distance of about 65 miles. Further experiments produced an improved method of transmission and last week communication was established between Monte Mario and the wireless station at Becco Di Vela on Magdalena Islands, a distance of about 160 miles.
