GARDENING

(By Mrs. J. H. Taylor, Bobcaygeon)

Following is a prize essay written for the Farmers' Advocate on the subject "Gardening":

Someone has said that if you are wise you will begin your garden in the fall, but I believe you should begin it in childhood. There are so many things to be learned in a garden, and impressions are so much more easily made in childhood. Blessed is the child who has a corner of mother's garden in which to revel.

What funny mistakes the children make? The way they pull up their plants to see if they are growing, and the amount of water they will carry just before, or more likely just after, a big rain when there is plenty obtainable, are amusing things to other people. Take care! Do not "children of a larger growth" do much the same thing in other gardens? How about the mistakes you make yourself? There was that first hotbed of yours. You were so sure you had done everything necessary to make it a success. Then you raced out every little while to see if the temperature was just right. To make sure you raised the sash every time you went, and the result was that the heat passed off too quickly, and so many of your seeds failed that you always vowed you would never try again. But you did the next year, and nearly roasted your plants.

You learned at last how to manage that part of your garden, but you find some difficulty teaching others some things you learned from mother so long ago that it seems as if you knew them by instinct.

For instance, the difference between the leaves of some useful plants and some weeds. Did you ever notice the remarkable faculty weeds possess of appearing among the plants they most resemble? Twice I have had my carrots nearly all weeded out, because the leaves of the carrot and Mayweed are so much alike. The same thing has happened with parsnips, but it was marshallow, not Mayweed, that grew among the parsnips. It does not matter how you move those two vegetables around in your garden from year to year, the Mayweed always chooses carrots for chums, and the marshallow has a perfect passion for the companionship of the parsnips.

But weeds are quite unintentionally responsible for much of your enjoyment of your garden. The cultivation necessary to subdue them is also the necessary thing to promote growth in your beloved plants. Added to the pleasure of seeing your plants grow, you feel the exultation that comes from winning a stiff fight. You feel like one of the knights of olden times as you sally forth to conquest, armed with a garden cultivator as a battle-axe, and wearing an old straw hat as a helmet thousands, and these Philistines met.

Like David, you slew your (otherwise weeds) seen as numerous as ever after the next shower. Someone has said that William the Silent showed his great generalship in the way he filled his depleted ranks. Measured by that standard, Parslane is one of the greatest generals the world has ever seen.

You persevere manfully, and learn that in gardening, as in most things of life, the joy of doing and the joy of anticipation are sure rewards, surer than those others, and that persistent endeavor usually spells success. You almost smell the roses when you prick your hands pruning the bushes, and if you are counting your currants in the blossom, perhaps that is just what the robin in the maple is doing. While you are smiling at the prospect of dinners from the vegetable garden and bouquets from the flower garden, possibly of a like nature are having a banquet, the cost of which you had not reckoned.

And the chickens? Bless your heart they know a garden when they see it and if their idea of gardening is a little bit arid, they must be given credit for knowing a good thing, and for indefatigable industry and perseverance in pursuing it. They know perfectly well that a ripe, luscious strawberry is food fit for a king or a hen, and that tomatoes, like a pretty girl, are very attractive when they blush. You learn at last how to control many of your enemies and that in gardens, both physical and moral, the good seeds to grow slowly compared with the evil. But there is this difference between the gardens. In the moral garden the bitter may flavor the whole, but, as E. P. Roe points out, Dame Nature is the greatest alchemist known. You may plant strawberries and onions together without affecting the flavor of either and so also the horehound and the watermelons. The prettiest moss roses I ever saw were grown in the middle of a potato patch.

The last joy gardening brings is, like many other last things, the best. It is health. All ye who are afflicted with nerves, whose nights are restless and sleep broken, go out into the garden three or four hours each day and work.

Robbers Held up Train--Get \$150,000

New Orleans, La., May 15. — While the Northeastern Railroad express train for New York stopped for water about midnight, near Hattiesburg, Miss., two masked men stepped along side, quietly overpowered the express messengers and brakemen, quickly dynamited the safe in the express car and got clean away with one hundred and fifty thousand dollars, largely in government bonds and cash. They escaped on horseback. A large posse of sheriffs and deputies are now scouring the country after them. It developed later that the bandits had overpowered the engineer and firemen at the previous station and ran the train themselves slowly, to the tank. No passengers were awakened or molested.

Richeson Pleads For Newspapers

Boston, May 15. — "There is nothing they can print about me now that is any worse than what I have already heard and read," calmly argued Clarence V. T. Richeson with Sheriff Quinn, in his cell at the Charles-st. jail yesterday, while he besought the sheriff to allow him to read what the papers were saying of his case.

Since the former Baptist minister of Cambridge received his sentence of death early in January for the murder of his sweetheart, Avis Linnell, all newspapers given him have had the news pertaining to the case cut out.

The prisoner's plea had its force with the Sheriff yesterday, however, and anxious to gratify as much as possible every whim of the prisoner in his highly nervous state during the final hours before his execution, which is set for the week beginning May 19, Sheriff Quinn will, for the remainder of Richeson's stay in the jail allow him the papers uncut, unless they contain sensational or unusually trying news.

That Richeson had not reached the limit of his endurance was apparent from the fact that he walked briskly back to his cell after the examination.

Stringency is a handsome bay stallion, foaled in 1906, and bred by Colonel Milton Young at the McGrathiana Stud, Lexington, Ky. He is registered in the American Standard Live Stock Records, at Ottawa, his Canadian number being three hundred and fifty-four. He is a perfect specimen of the thoroughbred sire and is regarded by the National Bureau of Breeding as one of the best horses of the American Standard. His breeding is of the very best. He is by the imported English stallion, Sempronius, and his dam is Tasmania by the famous Hanover, out of Devise. Sempronius is by the great English sire, Wisdom, and his dam is Hamptonia.

Stringency was a fast and game race horse, and has competed at different tracks all over America. As a two-year-old he ran five furlongs in 1.01 at Los Angeles, California, beating Rey el Binio, Detector, Pur-nace, Bliss, Carnon, Lucky Mate, The Brake, and others. At the same track he ran five and a half furlongs in 1.06, beating Hamper, Sharpdale, French Cook, Guise, Allen Lee, Wildwood and Holland. As a three-year-old he ran six furlongs in 1.12, beating the fast horse, Mel-petas, Senator, Barrow, Kokomo and others. At Jacksonville, Fla., he beat the fast sprinter Hammeimer, Dearheart, Brown Tony (holder of the Canadian Record for half a mile), Lady Caroline, Poquessing and others.

At the same track he won a seven furlong race from Turner, and also L. Daley, Gipsy Girl, Coonskin, Aunt Kate, Sandy Hill and others.

In 1909, during the California meeting at Los Angeles, he ran a mile in 1.40 1-5, beating a good field of horses.

When in condition Stringency could run a quarter in 23 seconds, a half mile in better than 47 seconds, six furlongs in 1.12, and a mile in 1.40. He is a horse of good disposition and full of quality. Through his sire he gets the best blood of England, and on the side of his dam he gets the Hanover strain, which is acknowledged to be the best in America. It goes without saying that such a specimen of the thoroughbred will have a tremendous influence on the horse-breeding industry.
