Both recovered entirely. He believes the method to be equally applicable to man, and urges that it be tried in all cases of death for it is quite possible, he asserts, that in cases of death from acute illness the actual cause of death might be only of a temporary nature.

This laboratory worker, whose re putation is international is known to scientists as an extremely conservative man. His positive state ments, therefore, regarding the results of his latest discovery have created a stir in scientific circles.
