## Lumber Company Must Pay Men Full Wages

A lawsuit of considerable importance is being fought in Lindsay, Ontario, by the Lindsay Lumber Company against a group of men who claim that they are entitled to full wages for the time they spent working for the company. The men, who are represented by the Lindsay Lumber Company, claim that they were employed by the company for a period of three months, and that they were paid wages of \$50 per month. The company, however, claims that the men were employed on a casual basis and that they were not entitled to full wages. The case is being heard in the Lindsay Court House, and is expected to continue for some time.

It seems that Bryan was returning from rolling the fields of the farm, and stopped on the way to the house, at the barn. There Miss Violet Teevins, a young Lindsay lady, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jas. Teevins, of this town, who is in charge of the school in that district, held the horse while Bryan entered the barn. When the heavy roller did not pass over him, nor did the horses drag him. It is therefore supposed that he was killed by the force with which he was thrown to the ground. The farm of Mr. Allen, where Bryan was killed, is on the 5th line of Inou.

## Father Slain by His Son - Tragedy in McKillop

## WATCH WAS GOING

Exeter, April 25.—Scarcely covered by the shallow water in Quinton's Creek, a stream in Uxbridge Township near here, the apparently drowned body of an unknown man was found early to-day. Examination of the pockets revealed a gold watch, still running and marking the correct time attached to a pearl fob. A tailor's thimble, a pocket comb and fifteen cents in silver were also found on the corpse. The man, who appears from his clothing to have been in good circumstances, was about 35 years of age. He was clean shaven and had brown hair, worn rather long. The length of the body is five feet seven inches, and the weight 140 pounds. There are no marks of violence, so far as has been ascertained.
