## Pure Stock To Be Loaned To Farmers

Ottawa, April 25.—The department of agriculture, under the direction of Hon. Martin Burrell, has decided to inaugurate an important work for the advancement of the live stock industry in Canada. It has been decided that the department of agriculture shall purchase well-bred animals, these to remain the property of the Government, but to be placed in the hands of such local organizations as agree to be responsible for their proper maintenance and management under the general supervision of the officers of the live stock branch. All the animals distributed will be bought, if possible, from home breeders, and will be Canadian bred. As far as possible they will be purchased in the province in which they are placed. In this way Canadian breeders will receive encouragement.
