ROADS AND MUSKRATS

SAVE ROADS BY BUILDING NESTS FOR MUSKRATS. The problem of how to save from destruction by muskrats roads running through marshland has been solved by a road engineer on the simple principle of building into the road better nests for the muskrats than they can build themselves. The engineer tried many expedients prevent the muskrats from tunneling into his roadways, for the thus made caused heavy traffic break through the roadbed and ne cessitate expensive repairs; but for a time he was unsuccessful. Then he tried the plan of building blind drains, with six-inch pipe, six or se ven feet into the road, with a T at the inner end, both arms blocked up by stone, and an entrance at the marsh end on a level with th? face of the water. These were provided every fifty or one hundred feet through marshland, and promptly all the muskrats adopted the new homes.
