"I Hope You Will Prove Worthy Sons of That Worthy Country"—Sermon to S. O. E.

The principles and ideals of spirit of all true service.

The above was the theme of a very instructive and interesting sermon delivered by Rev. Mr. Bryant, pastor of the Baptist Church, Sunday, the congregation being largely composed of the members of the Sons of England Society, who attended service in a body. The reverend gentleman's remarks were listened to attentively, and were very much appreciated. In part he said: "Your society exists for the purpose of exercising mutual helpfulness to one another, and to exercise a helpful influence on the community at large. To lift up the fallen and cheer the sad is a service divinely sanctioned. There should be no conflict between the church and an organization such as yours, and I hope, dear men, that you will prove worthy sons of that worthy country, England.

"There is a right way and a wrong way of doing things. A man may have great faith and be able to prophesy, he may understand the Bible, he may be able to preach well and excel in speech every human being, but yet if love be wanting he may be as sounding brass. If love for man is lacking there is something wanting, and if love be wanting there is no value. There must be a love in the heart that responds to God and responds to man in order to do anything of value in the sight of God.

"Love is sweet, generous, uncomplaining, bears a great deal and suffers long—it is a beautiful thing. If we would represent one another in the spirit of charity, we should exercise the wonderful grace of love, which suffers long. The man with a love in his heart doesn't envy. Even in the early days of Jesus Christ, as in the world to-day, there was that

can conceive of, and love never fail. It lives on, and on, and on. "The apostle says, 'And now abideth these three, faith, hope and love, but the greatest of these is love.' Man is most loved when his heart is like God. This love is a fruit of the spirit."

The speaker urged the members of the Order to practice that great love, and thus prove themselves to be good citizens.

CANADIANS ARE LOSING PATIENCE WITH SIR. WILFRED
The Liberal Party Faces Annihilation if The Senate Holds up The Naval Aid Bill

Canadian public sentiment has become decidedly aroused over the conduct of Laurier and his followers in the House of Commons. If the Senate is foolish enough to listen to the seductive voice of Sir Wilfrid and holds up the Naval Bill, the Liberal party will assuredly face annihilation at the next election. Regrettable as would be such action by the Senate it would strengthen the hands of Mr. Borden and the Conservative party as nothing else would. But the point at issue is there should be no delay in giving what assistance Canada can at the present time to the maintenance of the world-wide supremacy of the British Navy.

CARE OF MILK: CARE OF CREAM.

A bulletin entitled "Care of Milk and Cream on the Farm," just issued by the Nebraska Agricultural Experiment Station, deals with the conditions necessary for the proper care of milk and cream in order to produce butter of the best quality. The bulletin gives in a general way the precautions that must be observed anywhere, such as the importance of cleanliness, care of utensils, arrangement of the milk house, care of separator, etc. The importance of prompt cooling is shown by bacterial counts of milk held at different temperatures.

Owing to the difficulty of obtaining an abundant supply of cooling water in some sections, several methods of cooling and storing cream are described and illustrated in this bulletin. All the methods of cooling and storing given have been tried out and found to be practical.

The following is a summary of the bulletin:

It is impossible to produce clean milk and cream unless the cows, stable, milker, utensils and separator are clean.

To wash milk utensils use, first, cold water for rinsing; second, warm water containing a small quantity of good washing powder for cleaning; rich cream, more skim milk is left at home for feed, and there is also a smaller bulk on which to pay express charges.

Do not mix warm, new cream with cold cream until it has been cooled.

Keep the cans of cream in a tank of cold water until the time of delivery.

Wash the separator thoroughly after each separation.

Deliver the cream to the creamery or cream station early in the morning.

Deliver the cream not less than three times a week during the summer and twice a week during the winter.

Protect the cans of cream from the sun by covering with canvas or with a wet sack while en route.

Third, boiling water or steam for sterilizing.

Use a metallic strainer; it is practically impossible to keep cloth strainers sweet and clean and free from bacteria.

Skim the milk as soon after milking as possible, and cool the cream at once.

Skim a cream testing from 35 to 45 per cent.—the richer the cream the better it will keep. By skimming a
