MRS. HANNAH REA SHAW. Another of the old residents of Ops township was called to her reward on Sunday, May 18, in the person of Mrs. Hannah Rea Shaw, at the advanced age of 82 years. Mrs. Shaw ranked amongst the early pioneer settlers of the township, having been born and lived in the vicinity of Reaboro all her life. She was the daughter of the late Jas. Rea, who was one of the first settlers in South Ops. Her husband was called away 22 years ago, leaving her with a family of three sons and three daughters. They are: James, of Reaboro; Isaac, of Manitoba; Louis, of Lethbridge. The daughters are: Mrs. Jennie Hinds, Peterboro; Mrs. Sam. Skuce, O. meeme; and Mrs. Lena Hinds, Manitoba. Mrs. Rea had been in good health up to three weeks ago, death being the result of old age. In religion the deceased was a member of the Methodist church. Service will be conducted at the residence of her son, Mr. James Shaw, lot 5, con. 9, Ops, on Tuesday, May 20, at 2 o'clock p.m., by Rev. Mr. Lyon. Interment at 2.30 p.m. to Emily cemetery.

LATE MRS. CARLIN. The funeral of the late Mrs. Eliza Carlin took place from the family residence in South Ops on Sunday afternoon at one o'clock. The remains were conveyed to St. Mary's R. C. Church, where after the customary service interment took place in the R. C. cemetery.

The deceased was a daughter of the late Mr. Penrose, one of the Ops pioneers, and a prominent person in agriculture and general farming. The late Mrs. Carlin was of a very amiable disposition, and a life-long resident of the home from whence her spirit took its flight. The funeral was one of the largest ever seen in Lindsay, friends from all over the Township of Ops, Emily and the Town of Lindsay being in attendance. The deceased lady is survived by three daughters and one son. They are: Miss Mary, at home; Lizzie, of British Columbia, and Mrs. N. McMahon, of Lindsay. The one son, Mr. James Carlin, resides on the homestead. She is also survived by four brothers and one sister. They are: Peter, of Lindsay; William, of Buffalo; James, of Edmonton, Alta.; John, of Arthur, Ont.; and one sister, Mrs. Nicholas Brady, of Lindsay. Mrs. Carlin was 64 years of age, and had been predeceased by her husband two years ago. The pall-bearers were: Messrs. M. Moriarty, Jas. Cayley, P. J. Murphy, P. Quillan, P. J. Clancy and G. Skipworth.

HOTEL RANGE EXPLODES. Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., May 18.—An explosion of the water front in the large cooking range at the International Hotel this morning wrecked the kitchen and caused the death of Jean Junior, head dining-room girl, whose head was completely severed from her body. Several others were more or less seriously injured, two of whom Chef Frank Foy and waitress Laura Miller, being in the hospital. The cause of the accident has not yet been determined, but an inquest will be held to-morrow. The parents of Miss Junior reside at Echo Bay.
