Who Will Take Stock in a New Industry

A committee was appointed but I never heard from it. That is why I advertised in the Watchman-Warder, for I thought it might bring the matter to mind. Mr. Sylvester told me he would take stock. ### FOUR FIRE ALARMS

That was the Record in Two Days Last Week

Four runs in two days is almost a record for the fire team. That is what they did on Thursday and Friday. At about 5 o'clock on the former day they rushed away to the eastern boundary to find that the fire was at Mose Grozelle's stable some distance outside the corporation. Cause: boys and matches. Total loss.

That evening about nine o'clock the frame house on Kent-st. east owned by Frank Forbert caught fire and burned fiercely. It had been empty for a couple of weeks. A big crowd went down and watched as pretty a fire as one would want to see. Some roofs in the vicinity required close watching but the firemen kept danger at a distance. The house was destroyed.

At 11 o'clock next morning some sawdust took fire in the Parkin lumber yard, but the hose was not laid. Before one o'clock a small fire in one of Ald. O'Reilly's houses on St. Paul-st. occupied by Jas. O'Neill brought the team out again but the services of the brigade were not needed.
