THE NORTH WARD SCHOOL

We have spent a lot of money in repairs but find that it has been largely wasted. We bought firstclass furnaces but have had to put up stoves too for real cold days. Even then school has had to be dismissed two or three days a week on

required to meet the requirements of the ward. So we have got an es timate on an 8-room building. It is \$10,081. That does not include fencing, walks and some other things. We are asking for \$14,000 which appears to be at least \$1000 more than will be required, but buildings generally cost more than is expected, so we ask for enough and will use only what is needed. We shall sell the Francis-st property. It should bring \$1000. You have the power to raise the money; or you can submit a bylaw for the sum required, to the rate-

Col. Deacon-The school will cost a lot of money but we have to pay for these necessary accomodations. Mr. McWatters-If the \$14,000 is not all needed we shall not issue debentures for it all.

Mr. Thos. Stewart-We could keep the schools warm this winter by spending money on repairs, but would have nothing satisfactory for the money. The trouble now is a result of a makeshift policy in former years regarding both those buildings; we do not want to repeat that mistake. We propose to build a modern school of ample size and to last for at least 50 years.
