

PAID TO RUN AWAY?

Geo. B. Wilson, Father-in-Law of Frank Sullivan, Said to Have Declared that he was

On Friday morning Dr. Beattie Nesbitt spoke on the Gamey charges and introduced three affidavits of persons whom Geo. B. Wilson had told in Rochester, that he got \$500 for staying out of the country during the Gamey investigation. One of these affidavits was that of Mr. Thos. Leavitt organizer for the Conservative party. He had received a letter from one A. C. Davis, Rochester, saying that he had been told this story by Wilson. Mr. Leavitt went to Rochester and overheard Wilson repeat his story to Davis, and afterwards talked with Wilson himself. Wilson is Frank Sullivan's father-in-law. Mr. Leavitt swears: "On the afternoon of Friday, April 17th, 1903, Archie C. Davis, insurance agent of the city of Rochester, took me with him to the National Hotel, Rochester. "In the reading room of the hotel Davis pointed out to me a man whom I have since ascertained was G. B. Wilson, of Newmarket. Davis sat down on a chair on the left hand while I took the second chair to the left of Wilson. "Wilson recognized Davis, and at once entered into a conversation with him. Both men spoke of Canada and of the events that were transpiring there re the Royal Commission. "I distinctly heard Wilson say that he lived in Newmarket, and he had been got out of Canada to prevent his being summoned to appear in a bribery case in Toronto. "I distinctly heard Wilson say that the way he came to know that Stratton had bought Gamey was through his son-in-law Frank, who had told him that Stratton had furnished the money, but that Frank had paid it over to Gamey. "I distinctly heard Wilson say, that he had been taken to Buffalo, New York, where an agreement had been entered into under which he was to be paid \$500 provided that he kept out of Canada until the trial effect had been handed to his wife who took it with her to Canada. "I distinctly heard Wilson say, several times, that he was a fool because he did not demand \$5,000 instead of \$500. "When the conversation terminated Davis and Wilson went into the bar-room. In a few minutes they came back to the reading room, Wilson taking a chair in a corner while Davis went out of the hotel. In a few minutes I took a chair beside Wilson and entered into a conversation with him about Rochester and the state of New York. Wilson said that he was born in the state of New York and that he had lived at one time in Penfield, N. Y. He informed me that at one time two of his brothers had lived in Naples, N. Y. "I asked Wilson how times were in he replied, "Newmarket, Canada." He said that he had a nice little place there and a pair of horses. "TIMES WERE GOOD "I asked Wilson how times were in Canada, and he answered that they were never better, but that a great row was going on over there. I asked him what the row was about. Wilson said that a Grit by the name of Stratton had bought a Tory by the name of Gamey. "THROUGH FRANK. "I asked him how they managed that kind of thing in Canada, and he said the buying was done through his son-in-law, who had told him all about the transaction. I asked him what Frank's name was, and he said Frank Sullivan. He said that Frank had a job in the Parliament buildings. I asked

him how much it had cost to buy Gamey. He said \$5,000, but that all of the money had not been paid; out of the part paid Frank had kept his share. I asked him how it was he knew all the particulars. He said that Gamey had signed a paper agreeing to support the Reformers, and that Frank some time ago, had come out to his place at Newmarket and remained over night. That evening there were some young people at the house having a good time, and Frank had said to him in the evening, "Don't go to bed when the rest do, as I have something to show you." Wilson said he remained up and Frank gave him the agreement signed by Gamey to read. "Wilson said he told Frank to look out or he might get himself into trouble, but Frank said that Gamey was all right and would stick. Wilson said that when Parliament met Gamey had squealed, and just after Ross, the head of the Reformers had spoken, Gamey put a lot of money and the papers down to prove what he had said.

FRANK WAS SCARED

"Frank was scared nearly to death and resigned his job. Frank came out to Wilson's place and hid, so that he could not be served with a subpoena. Then he cut for North Bay. Wilson said Frank was afraid that he (Wilson) would tell what he knew if put in the box as a witness. OFFERED \$100. "They first offered him (Wilson) \$100 to get out of Canada and remain away while the trial was on. This offer Wilson refused. They then offered \$200, but Wilson said that if the newspapers had reported that Stratton was convicted and that he (Stratton) might get 14 years in the penitentiary at Kingston, and that he (Wilson) would not go unless he was paid \$500.

Wilson said they sent a conveyance to his house and told him that a subpoena was out for him. Then he was taken to the trolley line and went to Buffalo. They were in such a hurry that they did not give him time to get the clothes at home which he should have taken. At Buffalo Wilson and his wife and the rest of the party had stopped at a hotel just opposite the railway station. At this hotel it was agreed that Wilson was to be paid \$500, and they had given an agreement to that effect to Mrs. Wilson, his wife.

HIS WIFE WENT HOME

"Wilson said his wife went home to Newmarket on a Pullman, and that he was told to go to Rochester N.Y., and stop at the National Hotel, which he did. Wilson said that when Frank was out of his house before he started for North Bay Frank had told him that he was to be paid \$5,000 by Stratton if Stratton got clear. Wilson said that Frank would get more than \$5,000, and they would pay Frank \$25,000 rather than have the truth come out. Wilson said that while in Rochester he got a telegram from Frank, and that they had phoned the National Hotel from Buffalo telling the proprietor to give him the best in the house. Wilson said that if they did not pay him the \$500 when he got back to Canada he would give the whole conspiracy away and smash the Government."

Affidavits corroborating that of Mr. Leavitt, made by Archie C. Davis, insurance agent, and George Palmer, express agent, Rochester, were also read.


