COLONEL HUGHES' AMENDMENT TO THE LORD'S DAY BILL

MEMBER FOR VICTORIA ENDEAVORS TO HAVE BILL PASSED IN MORE EFFECTIVE FORM.

Col. Hughes introduced an amendment in the house committee on the Lord's Day bill on Thursday, as follows, which will come up the next time the house is moved into committee on the bill:

That the bill be referred back to the Select Committee with instructions: (1) To recognize the principle of individual liberty and the punishment of wrongdoing; (2) To avoid the possibility of making a farmer or other citizen a criminal and liable to fine and imprisonment for directing his hired man to hitch up his horse to drive to church on Sunday, or for himself gathering eggs on Sunday, or for doing any one of many other legitimate acts; and (3) To make it not necessary for a farmer or other citizen to give his hired man 24 hours' consecutive rest on a week day in case he has a cow on Sunday or do any other farm labor, said farmer having to board and lodge the hired man during both Sunday and week day; and (4) The said select committee be directed to make it an offence, subject to the exceptions hereinafter named, and to be unlawful on the Lord's Day:

- (1)—To conduct one's ordinary business or any other business for financial gain.
- (2)—To run for hire, or fares, or freight rates, by railway trains or steamships, with exceptions to be named.
- (3)—To blow or cause to blow any steam or similar loud whistle.
- (4)—To gamble.
- (5)—To buy or sell any intoxicating or malt liquor, or to play any game of ball, or other sporting pastime, or to advertise such or to collect or to pay fare for seeing such.
- (6)—To attend any such race or games.
- (7)—To ill-treat animals by careless attendance or by neglect or by inhumane driving.
- (8)—To conduct one's self in a disorderly manner.
- (9)—To be under the influence of intoxicating or malt liquor.
- (10)—To trespass on private property.
- (11)—To trespass on private property.

Council Proceedings of the United Townships of Laxton, Digby, and Longford

Council met in the township hall, Head Lake, on June 19th, pursuant to adjournment, with all members present. Minutes of former meetings were read and confirmed. Moved by Thomas Davey, seconded by William Armstrong, that this council refuse to pay the balance claimed by William Ward for his services as caretaker of the Norland cemetery, until he sends a satisfactory report of lots sold by him belonging to the cemetery during the year 1905. Carried.

McLaughlin-Armstrong—That Mr. William Ward's bill of \$34 for water to Cameron road be not entertained. Carried.

Southern-McCaughy—That the clerk be and is hereby instructed to notify Mr. Henry J. Johnston, clerk of Oakley, that this council refuse to take any action with regard to his proposition.

McCaughy-Southern—That the council purposes passing a by-law at the August meeting enacting that the concession between lot 25 on the 3rd concession, and 25 on the 4th concession be leased from the 3rd concession to Mr. Thomas Hodges. Carried. Armstrong-Davey—That the clerk be and is hereby authorized to post up at least six notices of a by-law enacting that a certain road shall be leased in Digby for a term of years, and the same to be published in The Watchman-Warder for four consecutive weeks at least. Carried.

McCaughy-Southern—That the following amounts be expended upon the roads during the year 1906 throughout the municipality of Laxton, Digby and Longford: \$40 on the Monk road, Digby; \$20 on the boundary between Laxton and Digby; John Foley, commissioner on division 26; \$10 on division 9, Digby; James Sulter, commissioner \$30 on quarter line from south boundary to Monk road, also in-cult north of Monk road, also included division 6 Digby; Frances Armstrong, commissioner; \$40 on the Cameron road south of the church, Norland, including repairs on the sidewalks; \$20 to meet Digby on the boundary between Digby and Laxton; Cornelius Sullivan, division 27, Laxton, commissioner; \$30 on boundary between Bexley and Laxton, east of Deer creek to Bexley's appropriation; A. J. Southern, commissioner; \$100 on the north quarter line, Laxton, William Armstrong commissioner; \$100 on Monk road west of Norland; Henry Teel, commissioner; \$10 on division 1, Laxton, William Simpson, commissioner; \$75 on the 4th concession, Laxton, A. J. Southern, commissioner; \$10 on the 3rd concession Laxton, J. H. Bailey, commissioner; \$10 on the quarter line across the 4th concession Laxton, between lots 4 and 5; Thomas Davey, commissioner; \$20 on the concession of Laxton and Digby, Charles Butterworth, commissioner; \$20 on the south quarter line west from Duck Lake to Victoria road, Charles Butterworth, commissioner; \$10 on division 22, Laxton, A. J. Southern, commissioner; \$25 on the 7th concession, Laxton, north from the centre quarter line to the north boundary, David Hilton, commissioner. Carried.

Southern-McCaughy—That the following schedule of wages be set: Commissioners to receive \$1.50 per day; common laborers \$1.25; man

and team \$2.50 for ten hours' work per day; and that the commissioners must furnish satisfactory vouchers for all municipal funds expended by them.

Southern-McLaughlin—That by-law No. 248 of the municipality be rescinded by allowing a man and team two days' work on statute labor for each day performed instead of three. Carried.

Armstrong-Davey—That Alfred Martin be appointed caretaker of the Norland cemetery, and must cut down and remove all rubbish in the months of June and September, and also make cemetery returns twice in every year and keep a record of all lots sold during each year and report the same to the council before the December meeting, for which he shall be paid an annual salary of \$10, payable semi-annually, and that he shall be supplied with the following utensils: Shovel, rope and two pailhooks.

Halifax, N.S., June 21.—The Liberal Administration, headed by Premier Murray, was returned to power yesterday. Two of the ministers were defeated—Hon. Geo. Patterson, in Pictou, and Hon. H. H. Wickwire, in King's.

Skeleton in Mysterious Cave

Andover, N.B., June 21.—A discovery that has excited the whole community and started scores of eager people treasure-hunting was made on Tuesday, when John and Charles Stewart, of Johnsville, blasted their way into an old blockaded cave and found there a skeleton with some old books dated nearly 200 years. They had some manuscripts purporting to be maps of other caves where wealth is hidden. The discovery was caused by the recent storm, which blew down a large tree, revealing a smoke-blackened hole under its roots, extending far into the ground. The miners got dynamite and forced an entrance, when they were astounded to find 12 stone steps leading down to a passage 7 feet long and 2 feet wide. This opened into a main room about 12 feet square.

Upon entering the larger room they were startled to find the bones of a human being lying in a bunk made of stone. The bones were dry and crumbly. Near the bones was a gold ring on which was inscribed "John Long, Dec. 4, 1779." A few inches away was a silver watch, which bore the date 1870, but on which can be found no inscription of any sort. Underneath the bunk they found three books, two in Latin, the third written in English. One of the Latin books was Suetonius' "History of Rome," dated 1667, and on the fly leaf were several Latin inscriptions, the highest of which read: "B. A. Strong, Oxford College, May 24, 1676." Cow Testing Associations

The Brockville association maintains its good record in this fourth test. Thirty four cows gave over 1000 lbs. milk, all but five of them testing over 3.0 per cent. fat. The average yield of fat per cow is again the highest of any association.

The contrast between herds Nos. 2 and 15 in the table below is very striking, the five cows gave almost as much milk as the twelve.

On the bark was inscribed a map and some written instructions, which the Messrs. Stewart are guarding carefully, believing that it contains a clue to secret treasure.
