Cow Testing Associations

The Breckville association maintains its good record in this fourth test. Thirty four cows gave over 1000 lbs. milk, all but five of them testing over 3.0 per cent. fat. The average yield of fat per cow is again the highest of any association.

The contrast between herds Nos. 2 and 15 in the table below is very striking, the five cows gave almost as much milk as the twelve.
