First, I did not say that the places of two teachers, one of 35 and the 63 other of 25 years' experience, were 296 filled by young men fresh from the Model School, but that five positions usually filled by experienced teachers 83 were so filled now. Then I did not say I preferred the nine grade system of certification, but I mentioned the fact that at one time there were ming grades, now there are three, with the prospect of only two.

Secondly, your experience of public examinations must have been singularly unfortunate. I have seen good ones and poor ones, but the worst were likely to do more good than harm. I know of nothing so well calculated to encourage a sympathy between parents and teacher. The late Rev. Father Stafford was a frequent visitor on such occasions. The law requires every teacher to hold two public examinations a year. The law should not be a dead

With respect to spelling, etc. which should be more convincing, an article in a New York paper or what we see every day with our own eyes? I mentioned newspapers, not magazines, because I understand the typesetting of newspapers is done by boys or young men lately from the schools, while the magazines are the work of experienced hands.

I do not object to New Normal Schools. What I say, is, you cannot take beginners, teach them what you like, and turn them out as they would be if they had had three years' experience before entering. Beginners must start somewhere. Let them take the small schools where time is not of so much cousequence as in large ones. J. H. KNIGHT
