ANGLICANS WANT SAME PRIVILEGES AS CATHOLICS.

Calgary, June 21.—At a meeting of the Synod of Calgary to-day Bishop Pinkham introduced the school question, complaining that, though Anglicans had asked for similar privileges as the Catholics in school matters, the same were not granted. A resolution is now before the Synod protesting against this.

London, June 21.—The London and Liverpool newspapers recently stated that the C.P.R. steamship Empress of Britain holds the record from Montreal to Rimouski. The Allan Line dispute this claiming that the Virginian holds the record.

UNDER ASSUMED NAMES.

Ottawa, June 25.—In the house to-day Col. Sam Hughes read a statement that there were 2000 men out of a total of 5000 in the Niagara militia camp serving under assumed names, and that many first year men were being set down as second and third year men so as to draw the increased pay. If such a state of things were true, said Col. Hughes, the offenders must have committed forgery, moreover the officers must be cognizant.

The minister of militia answered that when he saw the article in the question he at once drew the attention of the adjutant-general's attention thereto. In his opinion the statement was very much exaggerated.

TORONTO LIVE STOCK.

Toronto, June 26.—Receipts of live stock at the City Market since last Friday, as reported by the railways, were 41 carloads, composed of 539 cattle, 464 hogs, 615 sheep and lambs and 114 calves.

Exporters. Only a few exporters were offered—not more than three loads all told, and none of prime quality were reported. Prices for those sold reached \$5.20 per cwt. Most there been better cattle, better prices would doubtless have been realized. Bulls are worth from \$3.75 to \$4.25 per cwt.

Butchers. The best butchers' cattle sold as high as \$3.12 1/2 per cwt., one load of 24 cattle, 1100 lbs. each, sold by Corbett & Henderson, bringing that figure. Loads of good cattle sold readily at \$4.75 to \$4.90 per cwt; medium at \$4.40 to \$4.60; small-fed cows, \$3.75 to \$4.25; grass cows at \$2.50 to \$3.50 per cwt. Should there be a heavy run on Thursday, look out for a drop in grass cattle.
