June Session of the Victoria County Council

Grant Made for Agricultural Classes—A Business Session well and Thoughtfully Conducted—A School Section Dispute to be Arbitrated—A Large Amount of Routine Work Carefully Attended to.

TUESDAY'S SESSION. The County Council opened on Tuesday afternoon of last week, as noted in the last issue of the Watchman-Warder. The business transacted on Tuesday was largely of a routine nature, the referring of reports, communications, etc., to the various committees.

WARDEN'S ADDRESS. Mr. Taylor Parkin, Warden, addressed the members as follows: Gentlemen.—Since the January session the question of the relation of certain bridges to the County under the provisions of section 121 of the Consolidated Municipal Act, 1903, had been adjudicated by His Honor Judge Harding.

AGRICULTURAL CLASSES FOR COLLEGIATE. At the Thursday afternoon session of the County Council the project for the establishment of agricultural classes, and the giving of an assisting grant to aid in the establishment of same, was fully dealt with.

WEDNESDAY MORNING. On Wednesday morning the Council attended the funeral of the late John Hurley. At 9 o'clock they left to inspect the House of Refuge. The building, grounds, and conditions in and around this institution were inspected.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON. The Council opened into afternoon session at 1.30. The Warden submitted the report of the Valuers of Real Property in the County, and on motion of Mr. Young, seconded by Mr. Beattie, a report was referred to the Committee on Equalization.

THURSDAY'S SESSION. The County Council met in session in the morning, and were addressed by Capt. F. Holmes, Adjutant of the 45th Regiment, who asked for a grant to help defray part of the expenses of the regiment on its annual camp.

FRIDAY'S SESSION. On Friday the Council met at 10.30 a.m., with Warden Parkin in the chair and all members present. On motion of Reeve Begg, seconded by Deputy Reeve Jordan, the report of the Committee on County Property was received, read and adopted as follows:

Webster, repairing clocks, 3.05; Fred Brooks, stone for walks, 28.25; H. Armstrong, stone for walks, etc., 16.77.

Principal Harstone, of the Collegiate, was strongly in favor of the granolithic walks on Francis-st. He suggested that students might take up other classes while coming in for the Agricultural course, and also that if Mr. Reed's time was not fully taken up at first by the classes that possibly other classes could be conducted at other points in the county.

Mr. C. C. James, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, was then called on and he gave a splendid synopsis not only of this plan so far as it had been determined on by the Government, but also the prospect which it undoubtedly had for the future.

There were four parties concerned in the establishment of the agricultural classes, said Mr. James. The parties were the Ontario Government, the Board of Education, the County Council and the farming community of the surrounding county.

SATURDAY SESSION. The final meeting of the County Council was held on Saturday last at 11 o'clock. Warden Parkin was in the chair and all the members present.

Mr. Tiers presented the petition ann appeal of Wm. H. Graham, and five other ratepayers of U. S. D. No. 3, Verulam, Fenelon and Sturgeon Point, against the neglect or refusal of the Council of the village of Sturgeon Point to appoint an arbitrator.

Mr. Beattie, seconded by Mr. Byng, this was referred to the committee on Education. Moved by Mr. Beattie, seconded by Mr. Lowes, that the Finance Committee be authorized to report on the advisability of petitioning the Railway Commissioners of the Dominion of Canada for an order to the Grand Trunk to change its station at Omemee.—Carried.

That the sum of \$200 each be granted to the North Victoria and South Victoria Agricultural Societies. That the sum of \$10 each be granted to the East Victoria, and West Victoria Women's Institutes. That the sum of \$75 be granted to the township of Eldon as a rebate of their interest in the county stone crusher, the township having purchased a machine for their own purposes.

That no grant be made the 45th Regiment. That the salary of the gaol surgeon be not reduced. Your committee have examined the list of admissions, etc., of the House of Refuge, and beg to recommend that the same be filed.

Your committee have considered the documents referred to them, and beg to recommend as follows: That the sum of \$600 be granted to the township of Verulam on account of expenses incurred in connection with outbreaks of smallpox, the total expenditure reported amounting to \$172.59. That the salary of the auditors be increased from \$50 each per annum on account of the increased volume of the financial business of the County, and that leave be given to introduce a by-law to give effect to this recommendation.

On motion of Mr. Grant, seconded by Mr. Hawkins, the report of the committee on Appointments to Office was received and read and accepted as follows: Your committee have considered the resignation of the office of High Constable of the County, by Mr. Stephen Nevison, and beg to recommend that the same be accepted. Your committee recommend that Ralph Collier Vincent, Chief Constable of the Town of Lindsay, be appointed to fill the vacancy pro tem.
