

FURTHER AID TO TEACHERS.

Superintendent of Education Foreshadows Important Changes.

In an address to the public school teachers of North York, delivered in the theatre of the Normal School, Toronto, recently, Dr. Seath, Superintendent of Education, gave intimation of some contemplated important measures affecting teachers. The compulsory portions of the minimum salary clauses, he said, had, as they knew, been abandoned, though the principle been retained, and inducemen had been substituted. Further change were now under consideration, under which there would be still more inducement to the schools complying with the salary clauses of last year act. He urged upon the teachers the ity of improving their qualficaring of increased salaries. In this connection, he gave it as his opin ion that the third-class teachers' certificates would gradually disappear. The teachers would have an opportun ity of taking higher grade certificates by a division of the necessary work over several periods, instead of being crowded into a stated time, as now. The idea was to make the attaining of higher standing comparatively eas-Dr. Seath further stated that when

the new normal schools were open it was proposed to inaugurate a series of teachers' institutes, to be held in county for two or three days tentember of every year. These would staffs, and it was hoped that the

Immense Area of Arable Land Available For Settlement.
