# FUEL IN DOMINION

The Department of Mines at Ottawa will undertake this year important experimental work, says a despatch, in respect to the utilization of the large peat deposits scattered throughout the Dominion.

The officials of the department are also arranging for a further investigation of the extent and quality of Canadian peat beds, and arrangements are being made to bring over from Sweden an expert who can advise as to the various Eurpoean methous of utilizing peat.
