NEW YORK, June 1—Butter—Steady; receipts, 9711; creamery specials, 26 1/2c to 27c; extras, 26c, third to first, 21c to 25 1/2c; state dairy, common to finest, 21c to 25 1/2c; process, common to special, 18c to 23 1/2c; western factory, first, 20c; western imitation creamery, first, 21c to 22c.

CATTLE MARKETS. Cables Steady—Hogs Steady at Buffalo and Chicago. LONDON, June 1—London cables for cattle steady at 13 1/4 to 13 1/2c per lb. for Canadian steers, dressed weight; refrigerator beef is quoted at 10c to 10 1/2c per lb.

Toronto Live Stock. TORONTO, June 1—Somewhere in the neighborhood of 80 carloads of live stock arrived at the City Market, but not being able to get the returns from the G.T.R. we could not give a detailed statement as usual.

Exporters. George Rowntree, who bought 320 exporters, for the Harris Abattoir Co., reports export steers at \$5.70 to \$6.35; and Maybee & Wilson sold 23 exporters, 1230 lbs each, at \$6.40. Bulls and cows, \$4.75 to \$5.25.

Butchers. George Rowntree, who bought over 600 butchers' cattle for the Harris Abattoir Co., reports butchers' steers and heifers at \$4.50 to \$5.55; cows and bulls at \$4.20 to \$5.

Milkers and Springers. There was a fair trade at steady prices, ranging from \$30 to \$60 each.

Veal Calves. Receipts large, prices easier at \$3 to \$5.25 per cwt., with an odd one of choice quality at a little more money.

Sheep and Lambs. Receipts are growing, as the season advances, especially spring lambs. Export ewes, \$4.50 to \$5 per cwt.; rams, \$3.50 to \$4 per cwt.; yearlings, \$6 to \$7 per cwt.; spring lambs, \$3 to \$5.50 each.

Hogs. Buyers on the Toronto market are a unit in quoting hog prices down, at \$7.75 for select fed and watered, and \$7.50 f.o.b. cars at country points.
