## JURY GAVE \$50 VERDICT Breach of Warranty Claimed in Horse Deal

On Friday His Honor Judge McMillan held division court at Oakwood. There was only a small docket, but two cases being disposed of. Dr. Hall, of Little Britain, sued Thos. Glassford, of Mariposa, on an account. The defendant claims he had paid part of the account by giving the plaintiff oats and other farm produce on account. As he did not appear in court, however, to substantiate his claim, judgment was given against him for the total amount claimed. I. E. Weldon for plaintiff, Thos. Stewart for defendant.

### A HORSE DEAL.

There was, however, a lengthy trial in a case where Coad sued Percy Webster for misrepresentation in the sale of a horse whereby Coad claimed he suffered damage to the extent of \$100. There was a formidable array of witnesses including veterinary surgeons and others, the evidence being very conflicting. Coad claimed that Webster had warranted the horse to him to be sound. Webster, on the other hand, denied this and said that no claim had been made by Coad about the horse until after the animal had died sometime after it had been purchased. Both the counsel made strong addresses to the jury who retired and considered the evidence for a very lengthy period. When the jury came in they said they thought both the parties had been at fault. However, upon being asked by His Honor if they had agreed upon a verdict they said that they had agreed upon a verdict to the plaintiff of fifty dollars. This judgment was accordingly entered. Thos. ### TOOK A FIT.

Mr. George Hughes, of Somerville bought two pure-bred cows from Mr. John Graham of Blythe last week, and while driving them home, one of the animals "stampeded," foamed at the mouth and was with much difficulty kept on the road to Mr. Hughes' farm. She was left at Mr. Albert Hughes' in the evening, and next day an attempt was made to continue the journey, but when trying to drive her she turned on Mosom Hughes, and in jumping over a large brush pile to get at him, she fell, and died in about fifteen minutes. No cause is known for the mishap, as the animal was apparently all right when she left Mr. Graham's ranch.

### FELL ON UNFORTUNATE MAN.

Herbert Aldrich, a young fellow living at Nogie's Creek, but working at Kimmount, was seriously injured on Thursday, when a wagon he was driving collapsed and a number of ties fell on him. At the time it was thought a number of ribs were broken, but he was examined by a local doctor yesterday and it turned out that only severe bruises were inflicted.

It seems that the reach of the wagon on which he was seated broke and he fell along with the load. A man standing nearby stopped the horses, otherwise the wheels would have run over him, probably with fatal results.

### CHARGED WITH STEALING.

Friday afternoon of last week Edmond Hurren, V.S., of Beaverton, laid an information against Paul Godfrey, a professional chimney sweep, who is well known to Lindsay citizens, and who has traveled in all parts of Canada and the United States, charging him with stealing a sum of money amounting to nearly \$100.

The same evening Paul Godfrey appeared before Magistrates Wm. A. Robinson and W. H. Blackwell, at Cannington, to answer to the charge. The information was read and the defendant pleaded "not guilty."

Several witnesses were then examined on oath, including Mr. Hurren. Mr. Hurren stated that Paul Godfrey, in the early part of the day had had his pocket book and money, and that when Godfrey handed back the purse that he (Hurren) charged Godfrey with stealing \$20 out of the purse, and that Godfrey had said he could take Hurren's money any time he wished. Mr. Hurren also stated that he had, when he arrived in Cannington on Thursday afternoon about \$120, and that at 4 o'clock Friday afternoon he had not a cent, and that Godfrey had taken \$25 during the morning. At 10 p.m. the court adjourned until Saturday morning, when several witnesses were again examined, and all went to show that Mr. Hurren had had a considerable sum of money on him when he arrived in town on Friday morning. The bar-tenders at both hotels testified to Godfrey trying to get free drinks Friday morning and that afterwards he had money to pay for drinks.

On the strength of the circumstantial evidence the magistrate committed Godfrey to stand trial at Whitby, where he appeared on June 2nd, and was remanded for eight days in the county jail.
