Valentia Sluggers Outscored Little Britain Yesterday

VALENTIA 11, LITTLE BRITAIN 4

This was the result of the second game in the Mariposa league played at Valentia Monday afternoon.

The weather was ideal for baseball and it being anniversary day in that section of Canada a couple of hundred enthusiastic Valentia fans were present and also a handful from Little Britain. After the first innings the game was of the gilt-edge variety for both teams played almost perfect. The game was won and lost in the initial innings, Valentia scoring six runs on a couple of hits and five bad overthrows by the Little Britain infield. After this innings Britain settled down and looked dangerous a couple of times, being only three runs behind at the fifth innings.

The Valentia team, under the leadership of Mr. Victor Suggitt, formerly of Lindsay, have a well-balanced team and will make a good showing against any amateur team in the district. Many of the Valentia fans were disappointed when Manager Suggitt decided not to pitch "Dick" Gray, secured from the Lindsay Widawakes. He sent in one Mr. Thompson instead, and he pitched a fine game, keeping the hits well scattered, and having perfect control with men on bases. He was ably assisted by the star catcher, Hicks, who can throw to second bag to a sixteenth of an inch.

Manager Suggitt has a very fast infield with himself on first, Mr. Perrin, commonly called "Hokey" on second, H. Thompson at short and Gray on third. The infield had very little to do, not more than a half dozen balls going past them.

The Britain team have improved twenty per cent. since their first appearance a week ago and will make the other teams hustle yet before the season closes. In the first innings they were completely in the air, but after that they settled down and played stellar ball. The best man on the team was the "kid" pitcher, O. Heatley, who pitched his first full game, and he covered himself with glory, pitching a masterly ball throughout. With a little more experience he will be a star twirler. He was ably assisted by his brother "Mick" Heatley behind the bat. Rogers, the veteran twirler, played the initial sack and played it well. Yexex at short, Tompkins at second and McFadden at third comprise a very fast infield. Ferguson in left garden made a couple of sensational catches that saved runs for his team. Pogue and Stacey had nothing to do in their positions.

The twirlers had the batters at their mercy during most of the contest and very few hits were made. The feature of the game was the base-running by Perrin, Gray, Suggitt and Ferguson.
