ATTEMPT TO WRECK TRAIN.

What was apparently a deliberate attempt to wreck the Madoc passenger train which leaves Belleville every morning, was narrowly averted Thursday morning by the discovery made by Morden Bird, a cheese buyer of Stirling, and Henry Foster, of Belleville.

They were crossing the railway track a few miles from Belleville, on a cheese inspection, when they discovered several large iron bolts placed on the rails, near the crossing in such a position that the train, which was due in a few minutes, would no doubt have been derailed with the result that many lives would have possibly been lost as there were a large number of passengers on the train.

At this particular spot the train would be running at a high rate of speed. The two men had passed the same place a half an hour after the train from Peterboro had passed, but there was no obstruction on the track then.

The Grand Trunk officials are under the impression that the party or parties who attempted to wreck the train were after the Madoc train particularly, as the iron bars were placed on the track in less than half an hour's time. The matter will be investigated by the railway detectives at once, and everything possible done to capture the guilty parties.

The train was in charge of two well-known Lindsay railway men, William Fair, conductor, and D. Elliott, engineer.
