

TO CLEAN HARNESS

SOMETHING FARMER HORSEMEN SHOULD know. The following hints as to how to clean harness will be of value to horsemen in town and in country. To clean a harness, use turpentine or benzine, not kerosene, and a good brush. The grain of the leather. Unbuckle every strap, and scraper remove the grease has accumulated; then wash with water, using a good brush. Avoid letting the harness get more water than is necessary. After washing well, oil the strap, making it ready for use, working the oil in with the buckles, the bars, etc.

Next lay out the straps on a flat surface, and rub them on all parts with turpentine, which you apply with a brush. Put the straps aside for a few days, then rub off the surplus turpentine with a rag, and work up a good polish. To remove the tallow from the stitching.

Leather treated after this manner will always remain in perfect condition, and the stitches will not rot.
