



"LON'TS FOR SWIMMERS." The many drowning fatalities corded by the press during the summer season call for more care being taken by the average swimmer, and beginners generally, and it is ear-Earthquake shocks were felt at neetly desired that the following dont's for swimmers be posted up in a conspicuous place at the bathing place or summer resort the reader visits, thus helping to minimize any undue risk being taken by followers

of the sport: Don't bathe shortly after dining wait at least two hours.

Don't sit in a boat or stand about undressed after being in the water. Don't swim far after a hard day's work, or over-exertion after other forms of exercise.

Don't bathe in unfrequented or secluded parts. Don't bathe alone if subject to gid- Don't attempt to get into a boat diness or faintness.

Don't dive into the water without the stern until assisted to get in. first ascertaming the depth. Don't take fright if you fall into moving up and down, as in walking

Don't swim too far out in the sea water will support one if one hand expert swimmer. taken. Don't lose your nerve.

Don't take fright if seized with cramp; keep cool; turn on the back and endeavor to rub the place fected. If the leg is drawn up with Washington-st., in Rossland, the conpain, swim slowly with the arms tractor unearthed a rich vein of only. All swimmers should practice gold.

Don't swim without company you have a weak heart, and only after consulting a doctor. Don't swim against the stream

BEGINNERS. Don't go beyond the depth of your hips if you can't swim. Don't plunge or struggle when you find yourself in deep water.

Lon't throw the hands or out of the water. Don't grasp any person who approaches you; do what he tells you.
