Irregularities Discovered at Ottawa

Ottawa, June 23.—Despite injunctions to observe the utmost secrecy it develops to-night that investigation into certain of the departments of the Printing Bureau has revealed what are, to say the least of them, injudicious purchases of stock from favored concerns. One firm in particular, with strong political pull, is alleged to have supplied the Printing Bureau with sufficient quantity of a single line of goods to last for a dozen years. As a result of this discovery, it is understood, the head of the branch has been suspended, and other suspensions are to follow. It is denied at headquarters that anything is seriously wrong at the bureau, but the suspension referred to and the efforts made to keep matters quiet indicate that suspicions of graft methods are well founded.

During the last session of Parliament there were many complaints about the failure of the Printing Bureau to have their annual departmental report in blue-book form in time for the use of Parliament. It is also reported that many men are assigned to work in the bureau for political reasons, and that they are virtually independent of the responsible head of the bureau. There is also gossip to the effect that all of the printing done at the bureau is not Government business. Some advance copies of speeches, which have been given to the press by at least one member of the Cabinet, appear to have been printed at the bureau.

Town Will be Well Decorated For July 12

On July 12th Lindsay will have one of the greatest Orange demonstrations ever held in the history of the Midland district. A strong, experienced, energetic committee has charge of the affair, and are working overtime to make the day one of the grandest successes ever held in the town. The committee in charge have received the assurance of almost every lodge in the entire county, as well as those from Haliburton, Peterboro, Durham and several from Northumberland and Durham, that they will be present in Lindsay on the 12th in full strength. It will be the first time that many lodges from a distance have ever celebrated in Lindsay, and this in itself is sufficient proof that the demonstration will be a record breaker. The entire town, especially the business section, will be decorated as it never was before. The contract has been awarded to Turner & Sons, of Peterboro. 15,000 were present in Lindsay four years ago at the demonstration, and it is expected that

at least 20,000 will be present on this occasion from all corners of the Midland district. Special propositions are being made by the churches, societies, restaurants and hotels for the accommodation of the big crowd, and from present expectations, no person will be compelled to go home hungry. Several bands will be present, and at the conclusion of the big parade to Victoria Park the following speakers will address the large assemblage. One of the class, however, Mr. Hickson, who was principal of the public school here for a number of years, went on and wrote on the other four subjects of the course. His examination showed a total of 100 perfect on three subjects, 92 and 94 on the other two. His diploma has been forwarded with a complimentary letter from the examiner.
