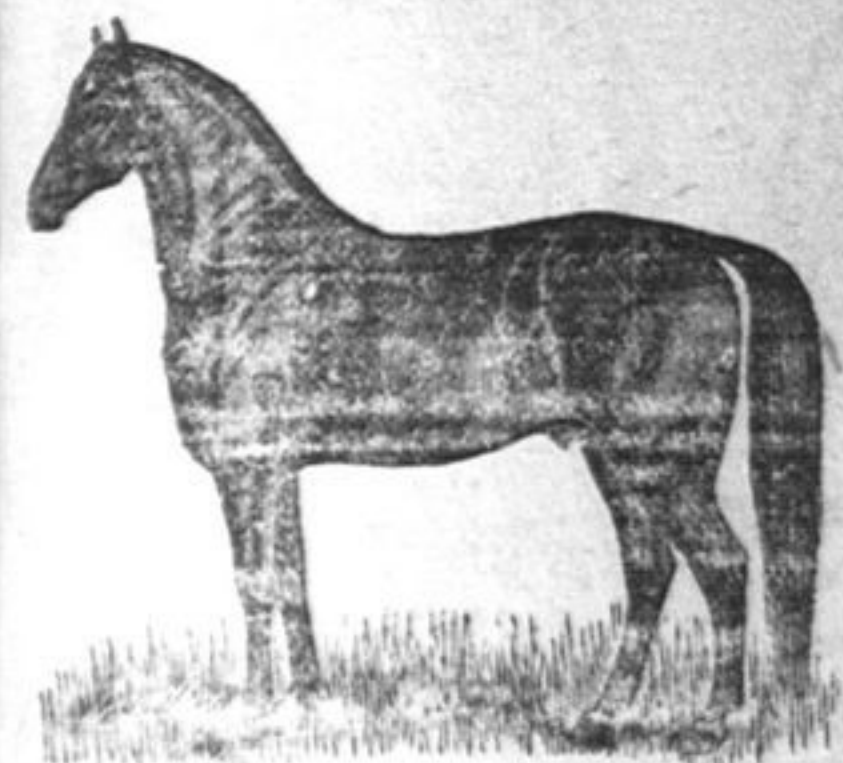

CYCLONE KILLS THREE

GREAT STORM 60 MILES NEAR MOOSE JAW.

Moose Jaw, Sask., June 26.—A frightful story of death and desolation as the result of Thursday's storm reached this city on Saturday over the long-distance telephone from the "south country," about sixty miles from Moose Jaw. A terrible cyclone struck the neighborhood about 2 p.m. on Thursday, and was immediately followed by a terrific hail storm, which swept a strip of the country a mile wide. Every house and shack in the path of the storm was destroyed. Three persons were killed, seven more or less seriously injured, and all manner of crops utterly destroyed.

The dead are: Ed. Maddigan and two little children.

Injured: His mother, two sisters and two brothers. A hired man named Wilson had his leg broken. Palmer had his collar bone broken. Thomas and Ward were cut and bruised about the face. As soon as the message was received medical help was rushed to the scene.

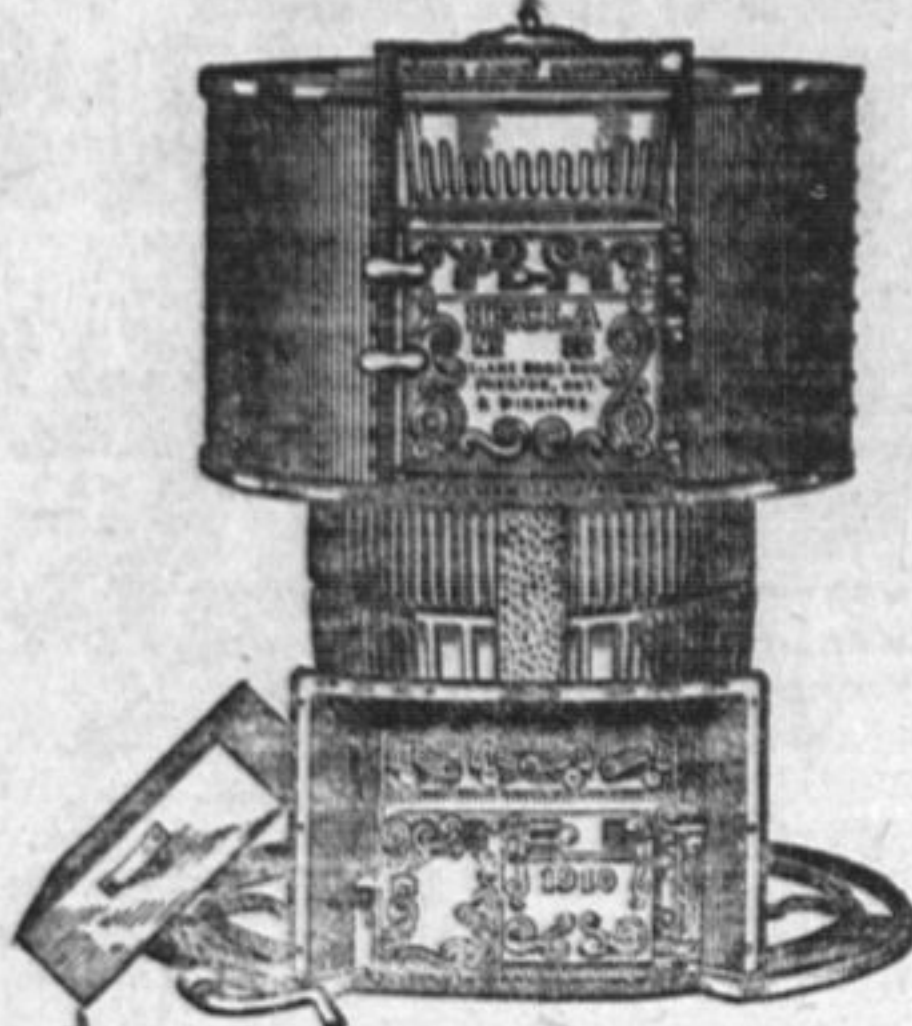

Militia Man Shot Horse Dead

Kingston, Ont., June 24.—To-day camp is over, and the different regiments, after 19 days under canvas, are removing to their different headquarters. This camp has been a decided success from every viewpoint.

As the train was pulling out at the G.T.R. Junction station a fine horse, owned by Geo. Bruce, which was grazing in a pasture, was shot dead by some member of the 40th Regiment. Who the man was or what company he belonged to could not be discovered. Two years ago another soldier shot at a man named Armstrong, and as a result the man came near losing his sight.

Fifteen Tanneries in a Merger

Toronto, June 27.—A new twenty-million-dollar leather merger, to be known probably as the Canadian Leather Co., Limited, is being formed in Montreal.

It consolidates fifteen tanneries, and will control 75 per cent. of the total trade in certain lines of the leather business.

The only Toronto firm to join the merger is that of Wickett and Craig, Limited. The other firms are: Anglo-Canadian Leather Company, Limited, Huntsville, Bracebridge, Toronto and Montreal.

C. S. Hyman and Company, London. Robson Leather Company, Limited, Oshawa and Montreal.

C. Gallibert, Son and Company, Montreal. A. Pion and Company, Quebec. Duclos and Payan, St. Hyacinthe and Montreal.

Paul Gallibert, Montreal. Seven smaller, but important concerns in Ontario and Quebec will also become part of the Canadian Leather Company, which will take over the fifteen companies and partnerships, free of all liabilities.
