Port Hope Times: Robert Moffatt Leith, the subject of this obituary, died at his residence, Perrytown, on Sunday, May 22nd, 1910, after an illness of several months.

The deceased was the fourth son of the late Mr. Malcolm Leith of Garden Hill, and had resided on the homestead until a few years ago when he gave up farming owing to failing health and purchased his late residence in Perrytown.

He was of a genial and hospitable nature and his happiest moments were when he was surrounded by his relatives and friends in his loved home. In religion Mr. Leith held the Anglican faith. He was an enthusiastic Orangeman from the age of 18 and a staunch member of the Liberal-Conservative party.

His brothers who survive him are Malcolm of Coulson, John of Cavan and Thomas of Millbrook. His sisters are Mrs. McCormick of Port Hope and Miss Leith at home.

The funeral, which was held on Wednesday, May 25th, at St. Paul's cemetery, Perrytown, was very largely attended. The service at the church was read by the Rev. Spencer of Canton. The Rev. Mr. Hear Leith very often during his illness, addressed a few loving and comforting words to the mourners at the home. Mr. Spencer preached a brief but very impressive sermon and our brother was laid to rest among his kindred.

Lot of Vultures after the Old Man's Cash

Toronto, June 28.—"Like a lot of vultures, after the old man's property," is the expressive manner in which Chief Justice Meredith described some of the litigants in the now famous Fraser-Robertson case, which came before him this morning.

"The action arises from the marriage of Michael Fraser and Miss Hannah Robertson, and I am moving to have Fraser declared a lunatic," said Mr. A. M. Macdonell, K. C., counsel for the next friend to Fraser.

"I wish the motion enlarged," said Mr. John King, K.C., counsel for Mrs. Fraser, formerly Miss Robertson. "I have a number of affidavits to put in—seven or eight of them—and when they are all read, it will be seen that there is no need of an issue to be tried."

"This matter will not be settled on affidavits," declared the Chief Justice. "It must be tried as an issue."

"We can present a strong case," declared Mr. King.

"What difference does that make?" asked his Lordship. "There is a strong case on the other side, declaring him to be insane."

"Not half as strong as ours," replied Mr. King. "One of their doctors is not an insanity expert."

"Perhaps he is better for that," rejoined his Lordship smiling.

Drs. Ryan and Arthur Jukes Johnson both declare Fraser insane, after a careful examination.

CALLS EXAMINATION UNFAIR.
"Dr. Clark and several other doctors were present, but could not in-

terfere in the examination, according to the conditions of the order," declared Mr. King. "The examination was a most unfair one."

Should Mr. Macdonell secure his order for an issue as to Fraser's lunacy, and the latter be declared insane, the way would then be open to attack the marriage on that that ground. Mr. King strongly opposed the court ordering such an issue, and asked, at least, for an enlargement.

"I have had no time to question the doctors who made the affidavits presented by my learned friend," he declared.

"You made no attempt to," retorted Mr. Macdonell.

"The last affidavit was put in only yesterday."

"That was a minor one; I'll withdraw it if you like and rely on those you received on the 15th," said Mr. Macdonell.

"Well, as I said, this question will not be settled on affidavits," repeated his lordship.

"Fraser is an old man of 84 years and his alleged wife is handling a whole lot of money," declared Mr. Macdonell.

"Not a cent," retorted Mr. King. His Lordship intimated that "if the old man was fool enough to get married," he must take the consequences.

"I don't appear for the old man, I represent the relatives," said Mr. Macdonell.
