HOTEL MAN ON TRIAL

LICENSE DEPARTMENT MAKES A CHARGE AGAINST PROPRIETOR.

Following the investigation into the death of Wm. Foulds after a drunken carousal at Atherley, near Orillia, some weeks ago, the Provincial License Department has started proceedings against Chas. Healey, the proprietor of the Healey House, of keeping a disorderly inn, and the case will be heard at Whitby on Thursday next. This is the first case to be tried under section 81 of the License Act, which states that a licensee convicted of "having an improper or a riotous or a disorderly house," is subject to the immediate cancellation of his license, or its suspension for a period not exceeding sixty days. If the license is cancelled the holder cannot obtain another for two years.

Pleasant Point, June 28.—Fenelon township adjourned court of revision and general business meeting was held according to motion passed, at last session at the post office, Pleasant Point. It was moved by Mr. Sims, and seconded by Mr. Tompkins, that D. Imrie be assessed for part 8, con. 5, M. Maybee owner; also that Angus McLean be assessed for part 8, W. pt. lot 9 in con. 6, as owner at \$150.

Moved by Mr. Tolmie, and seconded by Mr. Parker, that the following names be added to the roll as M. F. Arthur Landell, Wm. Landell, Robt. Landell, Frederick Swift. The following as F. S.: A. Thurston, W. Wilson, Jno. Tolmie, Arthur Parkin, and Foster Powles.—Carried.

On motion of Messrs. Sims and Tolmie, D. Brokenshire's assessment was placed at \$1900. On motion of Messrs. Parkin and Tompkins, Dan Campbell was assessed for the Glenarm Temperance House instead of J. A. Campbell.

General business was then taken up and several accounts were passed.

Tolmie—Tompkins—That in place of the usual by-law granting sums of money to various pathmasters to expend on their road divisions, that each councillor be appointed a commissioner to make such appropriations as he deems wise, limiting each commissioner to \$200.

Palmer Sims — That Wm. Parkin a couple of the Eldon Council at and D. Tolmie be appointed to meet Glenarm at 2 p.m. June 14 to adjust the expenditure on the boundary between Eldon and Fenelon.

Tolmie—Sims—That a by-law be passed at next meeting of council for regulating the use of firearms on the shores of the lakes and rivers in this municipality.
