Mr. J. McGillivray Electrocuted Saturday -- Well-Known Citizen met with Sudden Death

A sad tragedy occurred in Lindsay Saturday afternoon about two o'clock when Mr. Jack McGillivray was electrocuted, having met death by being grounded with 1,000 volts. Everybody knew "Jack," who was the hard-working and faithful superintendent of the Lindsay Light and Heat & Power Co.'s system and plant in Lindsay, and the news of his death was a great shock to the citizens in general.

The regrettable accident occurred on Kent-st. west and directly across from the Ross Memorial Hospital where the deceased and his assistant were putting up and connecting a new transformer to one of the company's poles. There was already one transformer on the pole, but a new one was put into place owing to the fact that Dr. Pogue has installed a new motor at his residence and additional power was required.

Instantaneous and his assistant, who was in the tree, states that he (Rampton) knew that something was wrong when he heard the snapping of the electricity. He looked at his foreman and noticed that he was leaning back stiff from the pole, as if dodging something. Rampton yelled for him to come down, but receiving no answer he realized that Mr. McGillivray had been electrocuted. Rampton quickly descended and went to McGillivray's assistance. The latter slid half way down the pole, but his spurs and his belt, latter being around the pole, held him and it was with some difficulty that he was brought to the ground.

Mr. McGillivray, who was born at Crosswell, Ont., was exceedingly well known, having been a resident in Lindsay for some twelve years in the employ of the L. H. & P. Co. He was an A-1 workman and could always be relied upon, and gained his early knowledge of electricity at the village of Fenelon Falls, where he lived for a number of years, and where he was for a time employed in Howry's mill, looking after the machinery and the dynamo.

The deceased was a member of the Faithful Brethren, No. 77, A.F. & A.M., and also of the Independent Order of Oddfellows, being past noble grand of the latter society. He was one of the best firemen belonging to the Lindsay fire brigade and an enthusiastic curler. In fact he was enthusiastic in everything that he took hold of, and a hard worker. He was a very efficient workman and fireman and will be a hard man to replace.

The funeral services were conducted at the grave by Mr. J. B. Begg, D.D.M.: of the Masonic order and Rev. Lord, Fenelon Falls.
