### Young Barnardo Home Boy Says Farmer Beat Him With a Strap

Some time ago a farmer by the name of Jones, who lives near the village of Omemeo, wanted help and communicated with the Barnardo Home authorities, who placed under his care a young home boy. The young lad was a novice as far as farm work was concerned and no doubt found the work irksome as well as arduous. He claims that he could not do all that his employer wished him to do and that because he could not be beaten with a long leather strap until he was black and blue, and not being able to stand the abuse any longer he ran away.

The young lad, according to his own story ran away last night, and on Tuesday he wandered into Lindsay. Here he was taken care of by the Children's Aid Society, and to them he told a very pitiful story. He was also examined by a local physician who found that the lad's back was badly bruised and in spots was black and blue, apparently being caused as the boy stated, by being thrashed with a heavy piece of strap. On the back of the boy's neck was also noticed a nasty bruise, which the lad stated was caused by the farmer grabbing him with his hand. The bruise had the impression of being caused by the man's thumb.

These beatings, it appears, occurred regularly and caused the boy much suffering, with the result that he took leg bail.

In the meantime after taking care of the young fellow the Children's Aid authorities placed him with another farmer. In conversation with a representative of the above society this morning it was stated that in many cases the farmers expected too much from these boys and that they were overworked, and becoming discouraged ran away.

### OPS COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

Ops council met on May 29th. From C.P.R. notice of application to the Board of Railway Commissioners for the privilege to divert the drive roads at Pogue's Corner so as to make only one crossing on G. B. & S. R. From Inspector Stevens, advising the appointment of a truant officer for Ops. From the secretary of the Board of Railway Commissioners, several communications in reply to letters sent by the clerk and the township solicitor opposing the diversion of the drive road at Pottery Corner crossing, also the plan of the diversion finally ordered by the board. From Toronto Construction Co. enclosing cheque for the gravel taken from the township gravel pit. From inspector of prisons and public charities re Ops patients. From Solicitor Stewart stating that because of the decided stand of the Board of Railway Commissioners on the Pottery corner diversion further correspondence on the matter seemed useless as the board refused to open up the question again.

John O'Reilly, asking for wire fences on his road beat as they had never been able to keep it open in winter because of snow drifts and they were now refused further passage through fields. Com. Walden agreed to see what could be done in placing the fences.

Mr. Heenan, strongly opposing the closing of the by-road in lots 19 and 20 in the 10th con. on the ground that it was a near cut for him in reaching his farm in the 11th con. Messrs. W. Moore and J. W. Patterson were present to urge the closing of the said by-road on the ground that it meant the keeping up of extra fences for them and cut Mr. Patterson's farm at a bad angle, and the said road being in ill repair let the township liable if accident occurred thereon.

George Fanning, asking for a grant on his road beat. - Referred to Com. Best.

Messrs. Maloney, Corcadden and Hickson, asking for a special grant on beat 70 on the ground that it was a leading road into Lindsay with a very heavy traffic and was in bad shape. Council did not favor the idea of making a special grant in any one division, but Com. Hawkins promised to do the very best he could with the money appropriated for his division.

Terrill - Walden - That Reeve Hawkins and Com. Best and Hickson be a committee to view the by-road in lots 19 and 20 and consider the advisability of closing the same, and report at next council meeting.


The amount of money to be appropriated for roads and bridges was considered, and because of careful management in other departments council thought it safe to appropriate for the road the full amount of the regular appropriation of other years and also the special extra appropriation that had been made later in the year when the finances permitted it. This was done with the understanding that each commissioner keep within his amount, and the by-law confirming the same was duly passed.

Hickson - Terrill - That if after correspondence it was found necessary, Reeve Hawkins be authorized to attend the sitting of the Board of Railway Commissioners to oppose the plan submitted for the proposed diversion at Pogue's corner on the G.B. & S.R.

Terrill - Hickson - That Reeve Hawkins and Com. Best be authorized to purchase a gravel pit for road div. 4.

Council adjourned to meet June 19, at 10 a.m.
