Lindsay Turned Down By County - Refuse To Guarantee The Bonds

Friday afternoon the finance committee of the county council again went into the discussion of the guaranteeing the debentures for the town of Lindsay for the purchasing of the plant of the Lindsay Light, Heat & Power Company, but the town was given a "black eye" when the county legislators refused to guarantee the bonds. Dr. Vrooman explained that in every town there are optimistic financiers who sought against such matters, and that they had some in Lindsay, but as far as the council was concerned they meant business. He stated that they did not wish to bootlick the people in any way but wished them to thoroughly understand the matter. He stated that there had been various statements made as to the amount of power which could be developed at Fenelon Falls, but some years ago a Government engineer had stated that this power would ultimately develop 2000 h.p. if not more.

In regard to the cost of the plant he explained that although it had been built at a cost of \$115,000 the Company had taken considerable risk and that now it was a going concern with a known reputation and earning power so that they considered it to be worth all of what was

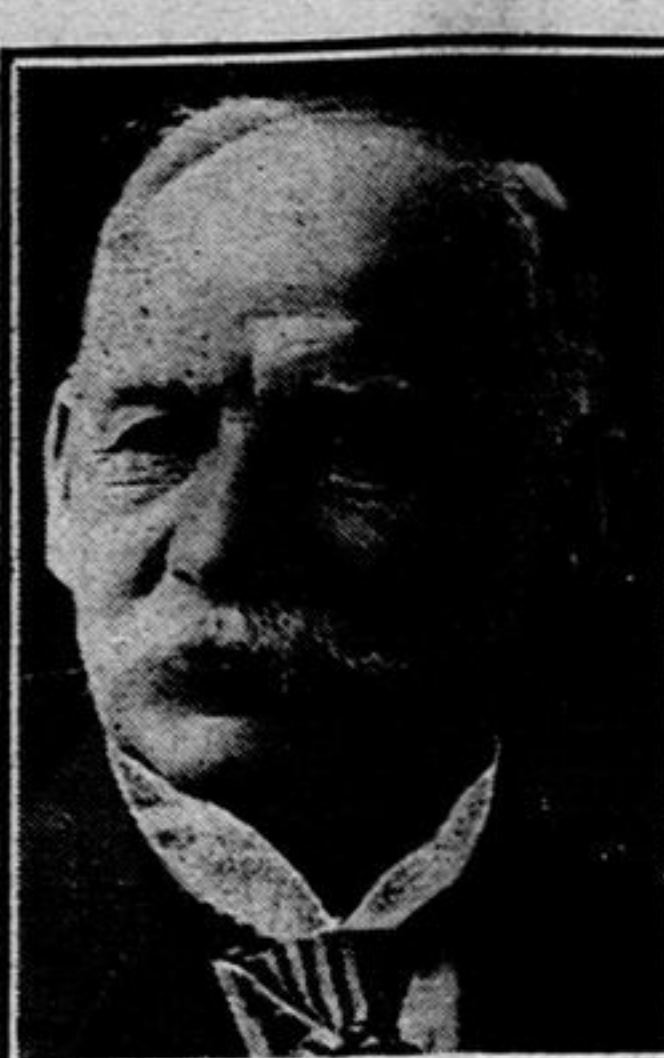

Mayor Beal's Address of Welcome to East and West Farmers and Women's Institute

At the annual convention of the East and West Farmers' and Women's Institutes held on Friday afternoon in the Academy of Music, His Worship Mayor R. M. Beal in extending welcome to the visitors, read an excellent paper on "The Canadian and the American Farmer." It was very lengthy, but nevertheless was a very worthy one and full of valuable and interesting thoughts. In extending a hearty welcome to those present the mayor said:

In extending to the members of this convention a hearty welcome to Lindsay, I welcome you to a city of no mean importance. Lindsay, among its many other attractions, is notably a farmers' town, being situated in the heart of one of the best agricultural districts in this great province of Ontario, and not only does it produce a market for the farmers' produce, but it also provides for his wants through the magnificent stores for which Lindsay is justly celebrated.

Lindsay is an educational centre and furnishes an efficient education its own children, and also higher education for the farmers' sons and daughters, and any others who may wish to take advantage of it.

And as you all know here is the home of the "Lindsay Central Exhibition," purely a farmers' institution, where for three days in each year (which we hope to see extended to one week) amusement and education are furnished to many thousands; and its advantages do not stop here, for in that splendid

institution the "Ross Memorial Hospital," it provides the best of care, accommodation and treatment for any who may require the services of such an institution.

As a place of residence Lindsay is one of the most desirable in which to live, healthful situation, wide avenues and comfortable homes, situated on the Kawartha lakes on which are numerous beautiful summer resorts and abundance of boating, hunting and fishing for those so inclined.

Not only is Lindsay one of the most desirable places in which to live, but its citizens are the most democratic, and while there are not many millionaires within its borders,

got into the hundreds of thousands it would impair that county's credit in selling bonds. He stated that he did not think that Lindsay need have any fears that all the water powers would be bottled up as the Government would not allow that, and if the town took power from some large concern they would get it reasonably and all they wanted. Mr. Michael stated that it should not have been necessary to discuss this question at all as the by-law asked for the guarantee. It was not fair to the council, he continued, for if they granted the guarantee and the by-law was turned down their voters would say, "Oh, you are easy, you gave that guarantee and then the ratepayers threw it down." If it was a good proposition, he continued, let it go ahead as a little higher percentage would not stop the voter and when it had passed then would be the time to come with the bonds.

Coun. Dobson—"If the county can help the home town without doing any harm to itself, and will not do so, I call it no good." He explained that the county derives a large revenue from Lindsay and they were not asking anything unreasonable.

Coun. Cornell stated that he thought it was the duty of the council to protect the county first and that by guaranteeing the bonds for Lindsay they might reduce the credit of the county. "I cannot see my way clear to the supporting of the bonds."

Dr. Sims, of Fenelon Falls, explained the matter fully to the council, stating that when the L. H. & P. had bought the lease from the government of the village of Fenelon Falls was not going to allow them to run their poles outside of the village but an agreement was entered into by which the Company was to pay certain taxes to Fenelon. The company was also to sell power to Fenelon Falls as cheaply or cheaper as they did in Lindsay. These taxes he stated, meant a sum of \$1200 per annum to the village and in case of a lawsuit with the town these agreements could be used. The speaker stated that he could not see that the plant was worth more than \$175,000 instead of \$280,000 as Fenelon Falls had a lawsuit with the L. H. & P. Co., in regard to the assessment when the sworn estimate was that it cost the company \$115,000 which with what they had added would make \$175,000 a fair price. He explained that both the town and village were tying themselves down to a certain h.p. so that if a large industry requiring hundreds of h.p. wished to enter either place they would not be able to get the required power, and would have to go elsewhere.

Dr. Sim's thought that the town was acquainted had complained that he was not able to walk to his rooms and that they would not carry his food to him. This might be only talk, he stated, but the council wanted to know these things. Coun. Dobson, also stated that he had heard some complaints. Coun. Graham stated that there had been some

complaints made but they should remember that some old people were subject to grumbling and that Mr. McNeill was the inspector and that they all had confidence in him. He moved that the council express its appreciation of the board of management and to the Inspector, Mr. McNeill, for the excellent manner in which the institution was conducted, which carried unanimously.

Mr. McNeill in answer to an enquiry stated that he visited the institution at least once every two weeks, giving no warning of his intentions and always found everything in perfect condition, the superintendent and matron being very capable persons.

Coun. Lewis stated that he visited the institution frequently and always found things in the best of condition. A communication was read from the matron asking for an increase of a hundred dollars. The council seemed to be of the opinion that she was already receiving a good salary considering that she and the superintendent and family were receiving their board and fuel. Coun. Lewis made a plea for an increase stating that they were tied down, having no holidays and that they had to put up with a lot. Coun. Southern, one of the board of management, stated that the superintendent had now an assistant and the matron had three girls to help and that they were already getting the third or fourth highest salary in the province. A motion was made that the salary be left as it was. Coun. Lewis moved an amendment that an increase of \$50 be given, which was lost.

Victoria Road asked for a grant of \$50. A communication was read asking for a grant to assist in the battle against the "White Plague," which request for \$10 was granted.

Ex-Deputy Reeve McLean, who dropped into the council for a few minutes was asked to say a few words and stated that he considered it a great pleasure to see so many of the old faces present. He stated that he missed the three meetings in the year and also the association with the members.

The library reports were read and adopted. The report of the County Magistrate showed that \$44.10 had been collected in fees and \$13.50 in fines. Mariposa Agricultural Association had taken in \$765.85, and expended \$606.10 and had a balance of \$159.45. Eldon Agricultural Society had a balance of \$447.26, having received \$1216.64 and expended \$769.85.

Warden Callan Addresses Council

The County Council met at the Court House on the 6th of June the June session, the Warden, R. A. Callan, in the chair. The Warden read his address as follows which was referred to the standing committee.

To the Municipal Council of the County of Victoria: Gentlemen:—You have assembled in compliance with the Standing Rules of the Council to deal with

all matters to which you are required to give attention at this session.

The Turnkey of the Jail resigned his position and retired at the end of March last. In making an appointment to fill the vacancy subject to the approval of the Lieutenant-Governor in Council, the Sheriff desired information as to the salary he might name provisionally until the Council could have an opportunity for giving the matter consideration. I took the liberty of stating that the same salary as was paid to the retiring official would be continued subject to your approval.

Under an amendment to the Registry Act the County is required to provide a caretaker of the Registry Office. In conference with the chairman of the Standing Committee on County Property it was decided to offer the position to the caretaker of the court house at a salary of one hundred dollars per annum, and he assumed the duties about March 17th. This action is submitted for your confirmation if it meets with your approval.

My attention has been directed to the need that exists for keeping the numerous steel bridges which have been erected by the county at great cost, in a good state of preservation by repainting them in a proper manner at regular intervals, and I submit the subject for your consideration.

In connection with the proposed construction of a steel and concrete bridge across the Narrows of Mud Lake in the Township of Garden, I take the liberty of suggesting that the two members of the Council who were appointed to act with the Committee in examining the present bridge, be added to the Committee.

Owing to the abnormal expenditure in bridge building with which you are this year again confronted, and are likely to be subjected for another year or two at least, the question of how the necessary funds are to be provided must be considered and determined. The provisions of the Anatomy Act passed at a recent session of the Legislative Assembly demand your consideration. A large number of documents which will call for consideration will be submitted.
