Bagshaw's silo was blown down; the roof of Mr. Blanchard's barn was blown off and the chimney of the Presbyterian church was also blown down. The church and school at Hartley were unroofed and considerable damage done to the barns in that vicinity. The storm was also bad around Janetville, five cattle belonging to Mr. Thos. Syer being struck by lightning and killed, while numerous trees were blown down and some barns damaged.

Text of the Lesson, II Kings xvii, 1-14—Memory Verse, 14—Golden Text, Prov. xxix, 1—Commentary Prepared by Rev. D. M. Stearns.
