Barnardo Boy Was Not Ill-Treated at A

Mr. Herbert Jones, a well known farmer living near Ontonago, was in town Tuesday and a Watchman man made enquiry concerning the story of the ill treatment of a young Barnardo Home boy, who ran away from his place recently. Mr. Jones throws an entirely different light on the affair and in part stated: "According to the home boy's story in last week's Watchman, he was very badly used and abused. But, I can take my oath if necessary that his tale is an untruth. He did not receive more than half a dozen slaps (the notable long strap in this case was one a little over a foot long) during his short stay of about two months. As for working qualities I really don't or can't find out where the novice part comes in unless in getting him to do the work. The thumb marks on his neck were not received here, but he had a pimple on the right side and would persist in picking it until he got it irritated, and so left a dark red place on his neck. Perhaps our worthy friends could find some resemblance to a thumb print in this. It would be kindness to all concerned if these people had only tried to find out why he ran away the first time; neither beating nor punishment in any form having been meted him unless you call a hot day and a field of stones punishment. Now, last, but not least, he crippled a cow almost beyond recovery, killed a pig, besides smashing several other articles. Seemingly, this was his first attempt at this kind of business for by his own story to be used up stock other places.
