He Played in the Garret at Night

Daddy's Bedtime Story—The Boy Who Wanted to Be a Musician

"YOUNGSTERS," began daddy, "here is a story about a boy who became a very famous man. He lived about two hundred years ago. His name was George Frederick Handel, and if you ask questions about him of any one who knows the history of music and great musicians you will be told that he was one of the greatest composers or writers of music that ever lived.

"But when George was a very young boy his father did not wish him to become a musician. He did not care for music himself, and he discouraged his son's learning the art. He wanted his son to become a lawyer. Although his father forbade him having any musical instrument to practice on, you may imagine how sad the little boy felt. He did not mean to be disobedient, but he thought that his father was very harsh.

"Somehow or other—I do not know exactly how, but I suspect that George's mother must have had something to do with it—the boy became the owner of a small clavichord. I do not think you know what a clavichord is, children, so I shall explain it to you. It was an instrument like a piano, but not as good as a piano. Clavichords were made for many years before pianos were invented.

"Well, young Handel took his clavichord up to the garret. There he stayed almost all the night, playing on the instrument, while the rest of the family was asleep. He did not dare to play on it in the daytime, you see, for his father would catch him at it and take away the instrument.

"When he was only seven years old George went with his father to the court of a duke near his home. I should have told you that he was born in Germany, but he lived in England the greater part of his life. At the court of the duke one day the little boy was left alone. He was doing the duke's chapel and sat down at the organ. He hardly knew what he was doing when his fingers touched the keys of the big instrument, but once he began to play he forgot everything else and played so well that all who heard him were astonished to find that so young a boy could be so fine a musician. The duke happened to enter the chapel, and he was enchanted with the boy's playing. He told George's father that the lad should be educated to become a great musician, and when the father objected, saying that he wanted his boy to become a lawyer, the duke said:

"It will be a great pity to spoil a great musician for the sake of making a poor lawyer."

 "Well, hardly. He's one of those newspaper guys."

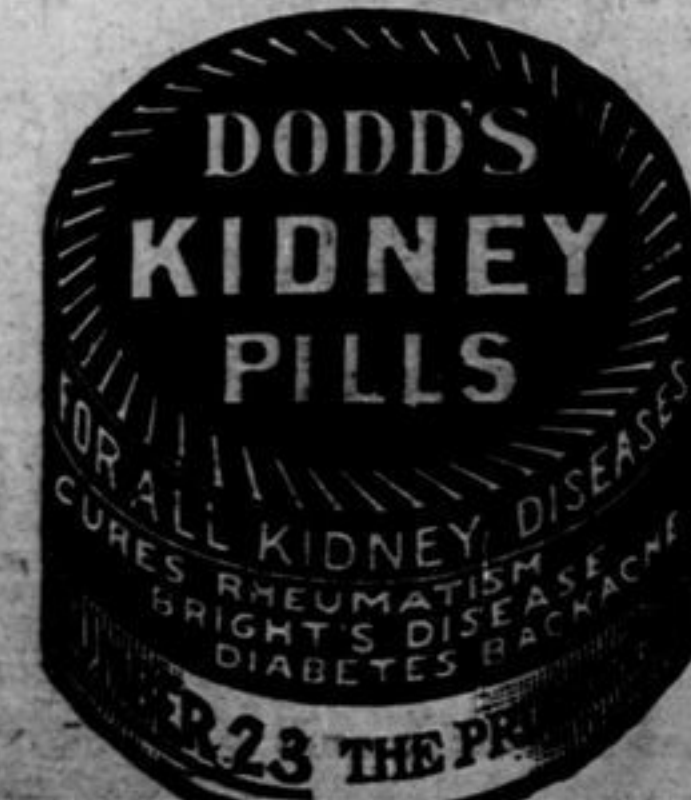
I see a man knock on a president's door
