The story of Hezekiah is somewhat fully recorded not only in Il Kings and I Chronicles, but also in the prophecy f Isaiah. A few weeks ago we were onsidering how he began his reign by epairing and cleansing the temple and y keeping the Passover for all Israel summoning the twelve tribes thereto He wrought that which was good and right and truth before the Lord his God, and he sought God with all his heart and prospered (II Chron. xxxi. 20, 21). Such devotion to the living and true God was more than the devil could stand, for all who will live godly in Christ Jesus shall suffer persecution (II Tim. iii, 12), so he stirred up the king of Assyria to fight against Jerusalem and by words and letters to mock and blaspheme the God of Israel and His people. To his blasphemy and revilings the people answered not a word, but held their peace, as the king had taught them (II Kings rviii, 86). Thus did David, according to Ps. xxxviii, 13, and thus did the Lord Jesus both before the high priest and

Hezekiah was thus able to speak to the hearts of the people because he was himself comforted by his trast in the Lord. "Be strong and courageous; be not afraid nor dismayed for the king of Assyria. There be more with us than with them. With him is an arm of flesh, but with us is

the Lord our God to belp us and to fight our battles" (II Chron. xxxii, 7, 8). In the portion assigned us today we have the Lord's answer to Hezekiah through the prophet Isaiah. It becomes us to be sure that God answers prayer ind, having committed our affairs to Him, leave all with Him in quietness even though we may not have as speedy an answer as the king had. 
