## Warden Jas. Steele Addressed County Council

The following address was delivered at last week's session of Victoria county council to the municipal council of the county by Warden Jas. Steele:

Gentlemen:--You have been called together under the provisions of the standing rules of the council to consider the estimates for the current year, to levy the necessary rates to meet the requirements for the year and to equalize the value of the municipalities for the purposes of the year 1913. Besides the discharge of the duties of the council in connection with the foregoing matters a number of other matters affecting the interests of the county will demand your attention.

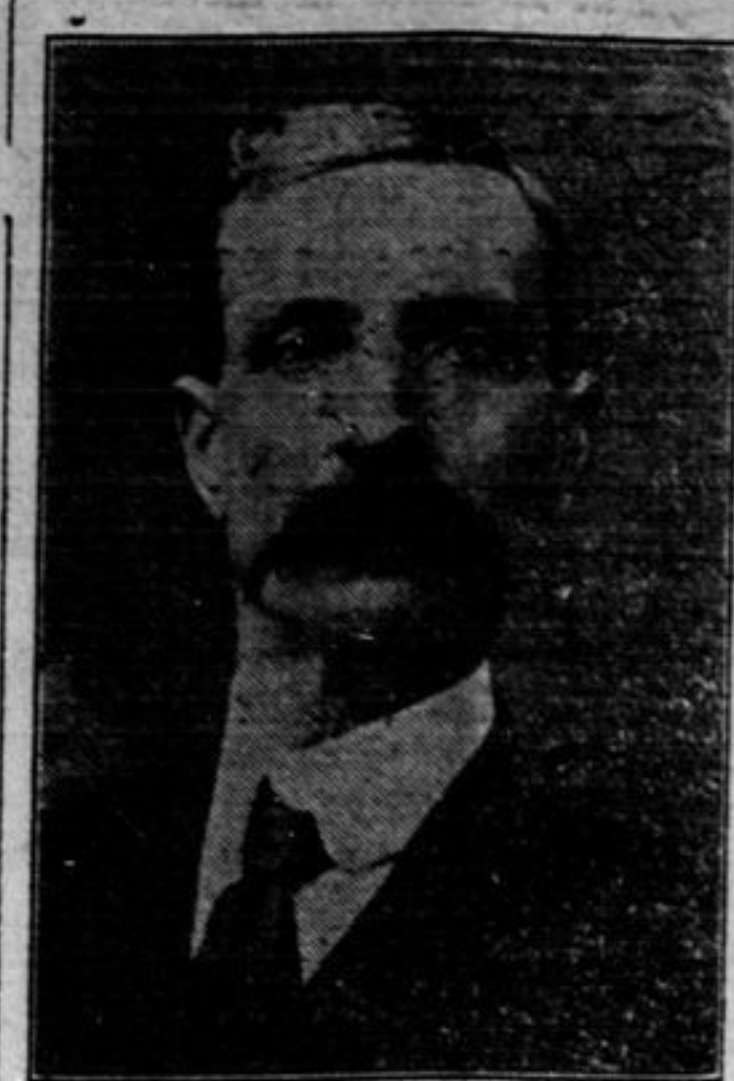
In obedience to your instructions the members appointed at the January session to represent the county on the provincial deputation to interview the premier of Canada and his cabinet on the question of Federal aid for the construction of roads, visited Ottawa. The deputation were afforded a very cordial reception, and definite assurance of generous assistance was given by the premier.

A deputation was appointed last year to join with others in interviewing the Government of Ontario relative to provision being made by the province for the betterment of consumptives. Owing to delays consequent on the elections, the deputation was not called until after the January session. I deemed it to be advisable that the county should be

represented and therefore attended with several other members whom I requested to accompany me. The deputation was received by the provincial secretary who accorded a considerable hearing to your warden and the others who joined in presenting the question. The Government is prepared to continue the assistance already given to the institutions which have been established in various parts of the province, but

of being the first Warden who donned the mantle which showed authority and dignity of office. The speaker said it was with pleasurable pride that he looked upon his colleagues in office, and to see them all in their respective places ready, as always, to serve their township and the county in its best interests. The Warden spoke at some length on the duties which devolve on such a body, and reminded them that the great essential was to do their duty honestly and conscientiously without dread of what the ratepayer or public might say concerning their strict adherence, and justice to all with special favors to none. The speaker said there was one member of this body he was especially glad to see present and that was our esteemed clerk, Mr. J. R. McNeillie,

it was laid down as a condition that in extending the facilities for the cure and prevention of tuberculosis that counties must be prepared to bear a share of the expenditure.

When your representatives were in Ottawa they availed themselves of the opportunity to remind the Hon. Sam. Hughes of the promise made by the predecessors of the present Government of a grant towards the construction of the Little Bob. bridge. I have reason to hope that the matter is receiving effective consideration.

At the recent session of the Legislative assembly a number of enactments were passed which affect the interests of counties. I shall refer to two of such provisions.

The act respecting houses of refuge has been amended and consolidated and the control by the council and board of management of persons committed to these institutions has been made stringent and effective.

The salaries of inspectors of schools, the maximum of which up to the end of the year 1911 was \$1,700 per annum, payable one-half each by the province and the county, have been increased to \$1,800 for the present year and are to be increased \$100 per annum until the new maximum of \$2,000 is reached.

The Warden next read the address. Moved by Coun. Michael and seconded by Coun. Southern that the various parts of the Warden's address be referred to the different committees.

Clerk McNeillie read the various communications received during the past six months, which consisted of the usual style of those letters, asking for grants and considerations. On motion of Dr. Sims, seconded by Coun. Dobson, the communications were referred to the appropriation committee.

On motion of Coun. Lewis and Babcock the members adjourned to Wednesday morning at 10.30.

After the adjournment the members and county clerk, Mr. McNeillie, visited the Ross Memorial Hospital where they were greeted by Miss

Miller, the superintendent of that institution.

After registering the men were taken all through the spacious building which is scrupulously clean and all patients seemingly happy.

After taking a look through the magnificent building, inspecting the operating room and nurses' home, the members started for the House of Refuge, where they were met by the superintendent, Mr. Robertson, and his wife. Here again the clerk went through the pleasant ordeal of introducing the council to the lady and gentleman in charge, who ushered them to the large waiting room on the left hand side of the main entrance, where each signed the visitors register. A look through the building disclosed the fact that marked attention in detail was given this institution. The old people looked with surprise at the visitors who on being questioned, testified that the very best of treatment the institute could afford was tendered them. The councillors seemed satisfied with the methods employed in running the farm as well as the inner workings of the institute. The outbuildings were not inspected as it was needless to do this, all cattle were out on pasture and the buildings are in good condition. After conversing with the inmates from their respective localities the august body returned to town perfectly satisfied that the poor and indigent of our county are well looked after.

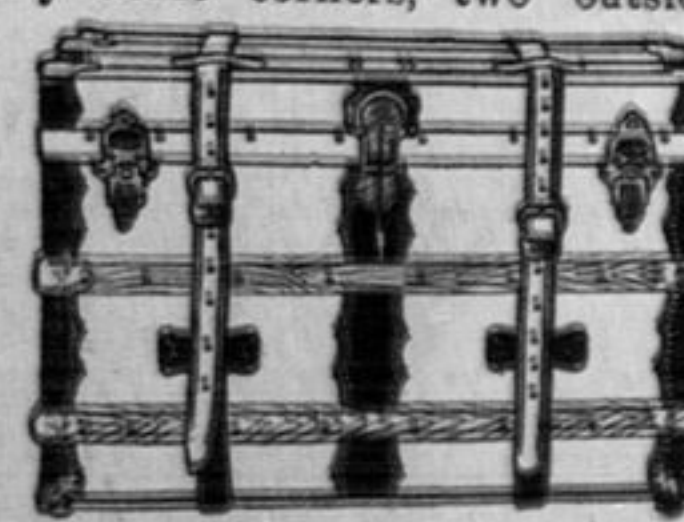
