Prospects For Clover Seed In 1912

Lindsay and surrounding community was visited during the last few days by Messrs. T. G. Rayner, and Calnan, of the seed branch department, Ottawa. The former was in the vicinity in connection with the Canadian Seed Growers' Association, while the latter spent several days in this community looking over the prospect for clover seed.
Many farmers will remember that last year's warning was given that the prospect for clover seed was rather poor in the usual seed producing parts. This year it is, if anything, worse, and it will pay farmers who have fields of clover to keep an eye on the growth for seed. If any are fortunate enough to have clover for pasture they should run a mower over the fields after turning the stock of the latter part of this month. If the piece is retained for

the mowing should be done early, when the clover begins to bloom nicely, so that the second growth may have a better chance. Farmers who were able to raise seed last year profited well by it and in view of the probable scarcity of seed this season every available field should be utilized for seed production.

A BUSY CONTRACTOR.
Contractor James Baldwin has had a busy season this past spring in erecting stone walls through the Township of Emily, in which place he built no less than five foundations. He also has the contract of a brick residence for an Emily farmer which he will undertake at first convenience. In Lindsay Contractor Baldwin has sufficient work to occupy his attention until the Christmas time, if the weather is favorable. All told the contractor speaks of business in the building line being equal to previous years.

Dr. McAlpine Favors New Government Regulations--Fewer Members on Local Board of Health who will be Paid

The appointment of a health officer for this district in accordance with Government legislation is considered by Dr. J. A. McAlpine, the local M. H. O. to be a good idea, and in the interest of the public health. The local medical health officer was asked by a Warder representative if the establishment of the office here would interfere with his own duties to any extent. "No it will not affect us in any way," he replied, "but on the other hand, it will materially assist in the settlement and adjusting of unhealthy conditions in adjoining municipalities wherein we have no jurisdiction."
For example if there is a case of scarlet fever or some other similar disease in Omemee or Oakwood not being properly treated or prevented from conveyance to others, the presence of the Health Officer will immediately be responsible for the correct treatment of the case.
The health officer will be to us about the same as the Provincial

Health Officer. The new office will be subject, of course, to the supervision of the Provincial Board. As district medical officers, however, they will have wide powers.
Only cities of 50,000 population and over will be exempt from the authority of the health officer in the various divisions.
Their duties will be to supervise all matters affecting public health. They will not interfere, however, with the duties of the local Board of Health as long as the performance of that body's duties are being satisfactorily carried on. Where a municipal health officer is discovered to be lax in his duties the district officer has been vested with authority to supersede him. It is likely that a reorganization of the local Board of Health will take place in accordance with the new act. In future there will only be three members in place of eight and they will be paid for every session held.
The intention is to inaugurate a general cleaning up of the province with a view of making it as free as possible from communicable diseases.

Cambridge-st Methodist Church Choir Visited Fenelon Falls

12 PEOPLE DROWNED

Buffalo, June 22. -- Between fifteen and twenty people were drowned and a number injured to-night when a fifty-foot dock at Eagle Park Grand Island, Niagara River, collapsed under the weight of 250 people, precipitating them into twelve feet of water. Up to midnight seven have been recovered, of whom six Mary McKee, Mrs. McKee's 10-year-old daughter, Mrs. Richeymer and her ten-year-old son, Mrs. Gallagher, Cecilia Kelly, 9 years old.
Missing: Mrs. Helstrom and 4-year-old baby; Viola Semf, Miss Irene Thomas, Mrs. Westfall, Mrs. Hyde. So far as is known all of the victims were residents of Buffalo.

Religious Fanatic at Belleville Judged Insane

Belleville, June 26. -- The strong arm of the law has been called into play to curb the strange doings of Sylvester Sabins, of Brighton. Last night Provincial Inspector W. A. Guntion, of the Department of Neglected Children, Toronto, and Mr. W. H. Wrightmeyer, its agent at Belleville, returned to this city with three boys belonging to the Sabins, the eldest of whom is nine.
The people of Brighton paid little attention to Sabins as long as he minded his own business and did not attempt to interfere with others. The Department of Neglected Children has had the family under surveillance for some time, but there was no active interference until yesterday.

Sabins came to Brighton in 1903 from Rochester. He is a religious fanatic of a most pronounced type. He gives adherence to no religious denomination, but interprets the Bible literally and makes it conform to his own crazy views. He considers himself to be a reincarnation of Jacob, his wife is Rachel, and his children were renamed Ephraim, Reuben, Peter and Ruth, under the delusion that they were really some of the old Biblical characters come back to earth.
Sabins' mode of life was as strange as his religious beliefs. He lived the year around in tents mounted on wooden wheels that he had himself manufactured. The family diet was restricted to fish, fruits, homemade bread, honey, milk, butter and eggs.

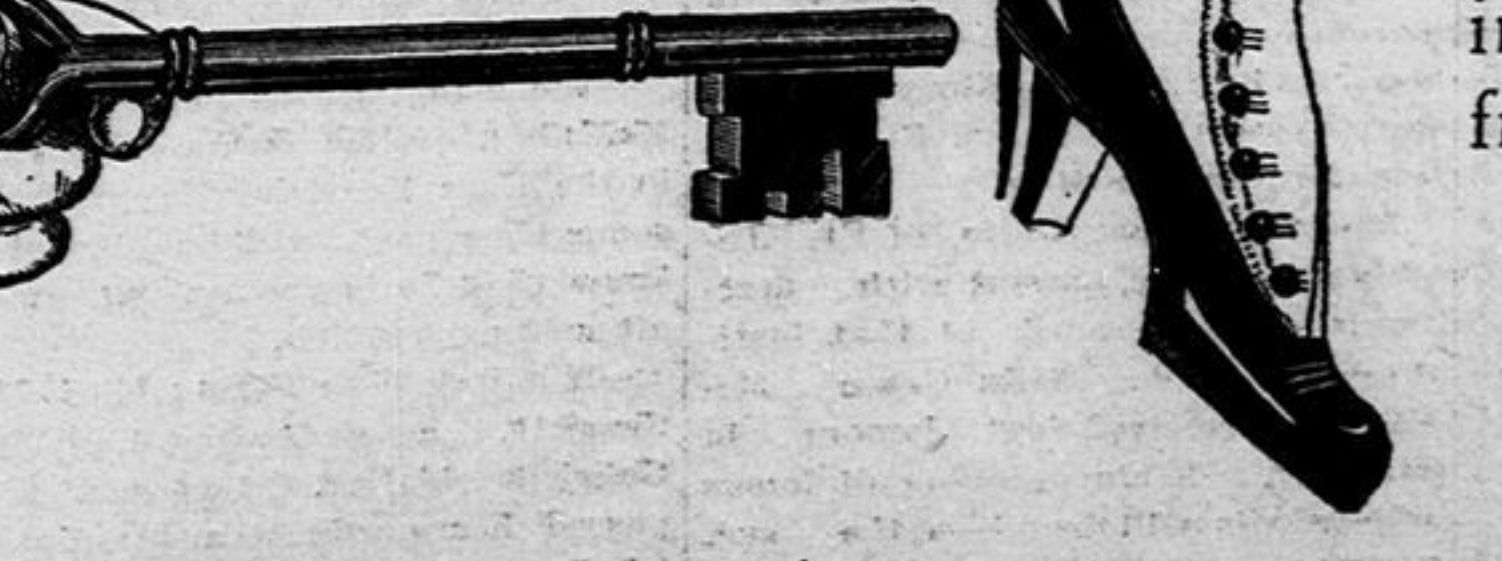

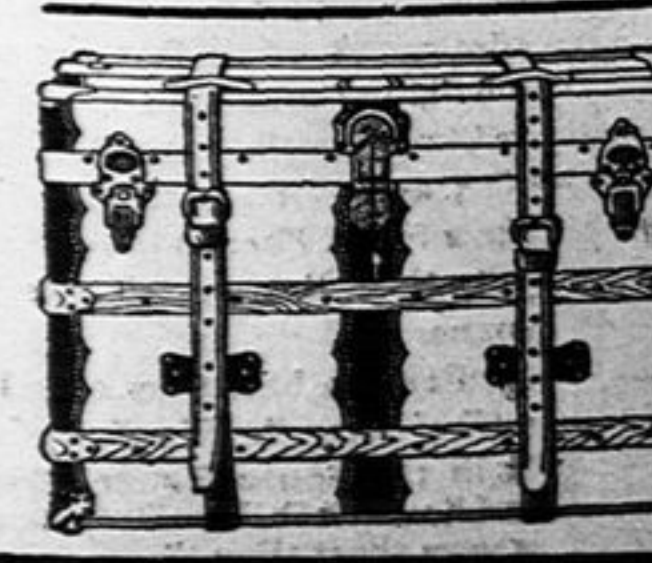
