MICHAEL McGRATH
Grandfather of Murdered
Child Goes to Asylum
Port Arthur, June 7.—Michael Mc-
Grath, grandfather of little Joseph
McGrath, who was murdered in the
home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs.
Redmond McGrath, in the outskirts
of Port Arthur, has been adjudged in-
sane. An insanity board, composed
of Drs. Chipman and McEwan, exam-
ined the man. They declared that he
had hallucinations regarding mem-
bers of his family, and that they
considered it unsafe for the man to
be at large.

Mr. and Mrs. Redmond McGrath,
who formerly resided in Lindsay, and
parents of the boy murdered, were
seriously injured by a person un-
known. Both parents were confined
to Port Arthur hospital for several
weeks, and for a time the life of Mrs.
McGrath was despaired of. All are
thought to have been hurt by an axe
which was found in the home, and on
which were blood stains.

A coroner's jury found that little
Joseph McGrath came to his death as
a result of having been struck by a
blunt instrument, in the hands of a
person unknown.
