Ops Council Proceedings

A BUSY SESSION - SEVERAL APPEALS FOR ROADS, DRAINS AND CULVERTS - AN ADDITIONAL GRANT OF \$400 MADE

The members of Ops council met pursuant to adjournment on Monday, July 3rd, at the usual hour, all members present. The minutes of last regular meeting were read by the clerk, and on motion by Messrs. Byrne and Calvert duly confirmed.

COMMUNICATIONS - From Mr. Thos. Fee, in reference to the cleaning-out, widening and deepening of municipal drain No. 1, urging that the work be done as soon as possible, as the drain in its present condition is actually useless.

From Mr. Matchett, county clerk, in reference to the payment of the foreman employed to operate the stone crusher.

From Mr. W. Curtis in reference to wire fence completed.

MISCELLANEOUS MATTERS - Mr. Curries declined to know if the \$40 voted to grade the 3rd con. line at lots 22 and 23, with a view of improving the outlet of municipal drain No. 1, had been expended. In reply the reeve explained that only a portion of the work had been done, as the ground was too wet to permit its completion. Mr. Hopkins said the whole drain needed repairing, and should be done when dry enough. Mr. Byrne then moved, seconded by Mr. Calvert, that the reeve on behalf of the township, notify all parties interested in said drain to meet him on Thursday, July 26th inst., at 2 p.m. on the Oakwood road at 3rd con. line, to consider and decide the best way of doing the work, and to agree if possible in sharing up the unavoidable expense incurred. - Carried.

Mr. Thos. Hawkins said he wanted a culvert put across 8th con. line at lot 8. The reeve said a motion had been passed by last year's council favoring it, and asked Mr. Hickson to explain the matter. Mr. Hickson said he was of opinion a culvert would do no good there, and on that account he didn't put one in. Mr. Calvert, commissioner for that division, said he might not feel justified in putting in said culvert either, but a motion was passed authorizing him to put one in if he deemed it best to do so. Mr. B. McGeough addressed the council saying he was a heavy tax-payer, and seldom asked any favors from the council, but was now obliged to call their attention to the dangerous condition of the road on the hill near his place, which being furrowed by the heavy rains was in bad need of grading.

Messrs. Wm. Rea and Wm. Reid laid before council the necessity of tiling about 40 rods on the west side of the 9th con. line, at lot 6, with 6 or 8 inch tile to convey the water to Stoney Creek, and volunteered to do the work with others interested if the council would supply the tile. After considering the benefit of said tiling to the road a motion by Messrs. Calvert and Hickson, that the council procure 6 inch tile sufficient for 40 rods of drain, on condition that the persons directly interested place the same as directed by the commissioner, and that if 8 inch tile be used instead of 6 inch, said persons pay the difference, was carried without dissent.

Mr. Jas. Cayley, owner of east half 11, con. 2, said that his land was occasionally flooded by water, which would flow eastward across the roadway if a culvert were placed there. After viewing a diagram of the place the council, on motion by Messrs. Byrne and Curries, placed the case in Mr. Hickson's hands to take such an action as he deemed best and report at next meeting.

Messrs. Jas. Parker and Stephen Oliver were next heard. The former said he had rented a strip of land near the Parkin mill from Mr. Chas. Britton, and had also cropped about 12 or 13 rods of the road allowance adjoining; he was willing to pay fair rent for said bit of road, and desired to lease it during the term of his lease with Mr. Britton. He had had possession for some time, but his neighbor, Mr. Oliver, through personal spite, wanted to deprive him of his rights.

Mr. Oliver retailed vigorously, saying he had recently bought the Parker lot, part of No. 4 Block U; that the lane leading thereto was only eight feet wide; that J. Parker was only a trespasser; he neither did roadwork nor paid taxes; that he (Oliver) had a right to said piece of road, was willing to pay fair rent for it, and would give up possession any time it was required as a public highway. Mr. Oliver's plea was forcible and convincing, but the council decided not to lease the roadway at present, since Mr. Parker had it planted, and a motion was passed instructing the clerk to demand \$1.50 from Mr. Parker for permission to retain said roadway until the time for saving the crop thereon shall have elapsed.

MORE COMPLAINTS - Mr. P. Kirley stated that some persons doing road jobs or statute labor had undermined his fence for gravel, although the township pit was only a few rods distant across the roadway. He held the council responsible and wanted fair compensation for the injury done his property. The council regretted the occurrence and instructed Mr. Hickson to ascertain the loss sustained by Mr. Kirley and the names of the trespassers, that they may settle the matter or be brought to justice.

Mr. Jno. Brady complained that the drain west of his place had not yet been repaired, and Messrs. Byrne and Calvert were, on motion by Messrs. Curries and Hickson, instructed to repair it at discretion.

Mr. Wm. Grace, who owns lot 28, con. 11, said he had been paying taxes for several years in Ops without any return therefor, and was anxious to have some draining done at the N.E. corner of the township, as the surplus water from that part of Ops might easily be conducted into Verulam creek, some 40 or 50 rods distant, which creek, it seems, has recently been cleaned out and affords ample fall for the desired drainage. It was agreed that Mr.

Currins would confer with Verulam council with a view of tapping said creek with a drain from Ops.

\$400 MORE VOTED FOR OPS ROADS. Owing to the urgent need of repairs on many of the roads throughout the township, the council felt themselves in duty bound to grant \$400 more for roads, over and above the appropriations already made, and a motion by Messrs. Byrne and Hickson to that effect was carried without dissent, such grant to be divided as follows: For road divisions No. 1 and 2 \$36.50 each, and for Divisions Nos. 3, 4 and 5 east of the river \$30 each.

Mr. Robt. Thorne of Reaboro said the people of that village would like to have a little better sidewalk accommodation; that many of them used no other roads, though taxpayers, and thought the council should add another line of plank that they might go two abreast in future. He had reserved a few dollars of statute labor money, and if the council would supplement it with say, ten dollars, they would ask no more. On motion by Messrs. Byrne and Hickson, the side-walk matter was recommended to Mr. Calvert as a worthy object for his consideration in expending his surplus.

The reeve reported that he had accompanied Commissioner Byrne when letting contracts in road division No. 4, as directed by resolution of council at last meeting, and that they had viewed the 6th con. line at lot No. 7, for which about thirty petitioners had asked a grant of \$25, but did not feel justified in making such expenditure, as it would be a wilful waste of money.

The reeve thought it a queer freak of human nature that some ratepayers would sign a petition in favor of some project, and at the same time wish that the prayer would not be granted.

Mr. Hickson moved, seconded by Mr. Curries, that the \$11 paid by Mr. John Brady last year in lieu of statute labor be expended on beat No. 62, by Coun. Byrne. - Carried.

MODEL WIRE FENCES - Mr. Curries reported that Mr. M. Farrelly had built on north side of Downeyville road 150 rods of the best and prettiest wire fence he had ever seen; eleven strands of wire; posts neatly turned and painted, and the ground nicely graded.

Mr. Hickson certified to 80 rods of excellent wire fence built by W. Curtis on west side of 3rd con. road, lot 12, with posts turned and painted.

Reeve Hopkins also stated that Chas. Minty had completed 60 rods of good wire fence on 1st con. roadway at lot 23.

On motion by Messrs. Byrne and Hickson the reeve issued orders for \$30, \$16 and \$12 respectively, in favor of Messrs. Farrelly, Curtis and Minty, as a bonus to each, under by-law No. 520.

After sundry bills, accounts and interim orders had been examined and passed they were paid on motion by Messrs. Curries and Byrne.

Mr. Thos. Moore was permitted to build 26 rods of wire fence next to the part built by Mr. Minty, after which the council adjourned till Monday, August 21st prox., at 10 a.m.
