Quebec City Suffers Seriously Again From Fire.

The Beginning Was Small, But Inflammable Material and Wind Made a Disastrous Ending - Notre Dame Church in Danger-The Royal Canadian Artillery Turned Out and Tore Down a Couple of Houses.

Quebec, July 19 .- At 3 o'clock yesterday fire broke out in the first story of a house on the corner of Richardson street and Boulevard Langelier. The woodwork in the vicinity of the fire was dry and ignited like tinder. Next to the building where the fire originated was a shop full of inflammable material, such as varnish, oils, etc. Unfortunately there is a break in the water main, and the supply of water by the old pipes was very poor. A strong northeast wind was blowing, and the fire spread rapidly, notwithstanding the firemen's efforts. A detachmenet of the Royal Canadian

Artillery, under command of Major Stone

and Captains Benson and Imlah, was called from the citadel, and they set to work at once pulling down two houses belonging to Messrs. Guay and Bourget, in order to stop the progress of the fire. At 5 o'clock 29 houses had been destroyed, and the fire was still raging fiercely, threatening to spread in the direction of the large Congregation de Notre Dame Church (Roman Catholic), situated on the corner of St. Joseph and Caron streets. At 7 o'clock the fire brigade succeeded in getting the fire under control, but not before it had reduced to ashes between 60 and 70 houses. The fire covered three blocks in area, from Richardson street, on the Boulevard Langelier, to St. Francis street, destroying houses on King street and on both sides of the street between St. Anselme and Boulevard Langelier. Loss, \$100,000; insurance, \$50,000.

THE TRANSVAAL.

British Government Regards the Grant ing of the Seven-Year Franchise as Practically Ending the Crisis.

London, July 19 .- The Times this morning says: The Government attaches the highest importance to the Volksraad's seven-year proposal, which is regarded as practically ending the crisis.

THE BOER FRANCHISE BILL Discussed by the Volksraad and the Seven-Year Franchise Was Endorsed.

Pretoria, July 19.-The Volksraad resumed discussion of the franchise bill at its session yesterday. The trend of the debate favored seven years' retrospective and prospective franchise. Replying to a question, President Kruger reviewed the Bloemfontein conference, and said that the proposals of Sir Alfred Milner, Governor of Cape Colony and British high commissioner of South Africa, were too wide, but that alteration from nine to seven years was only a slight difference, and for reasons of honesty and righteousness he (President Kruger) recommended the alteration. The Government would not be endangered thereby, but would gain the applause of the world.

The Volksraad, in secret session, ultimately adopted the seven years' franchise proposition.

An Ultimatum to the Boers. London, July 19 .- Considerable importance attaches to yesterday's Cabinet meeting, as it is understood that the Colonial Office late last night issued to the Ministers an important communication relative to South Africa. The general trend of the news from that country

points to a peaceful settlement of existing difficulties there. Rhedes Warmly Welcomed.

Cape Town, July 19 .- Mr. Cecil Rhodes, formerly Premier of Cape Colony, arrived here yesterday. He was welcomed by a reception committee, composed of influential citizens, and enthusiastically cheered as he traversed the streets. Many of the buildings of Cape Town were decorated with bunting, and in front of the town hall a big arch had been erected, bearing the words: "Welcome, Great Pioneer, Cape Town-Cairo.'

ESTERHAZY WROTE BORDEREAU.

A Statement Printed in the Paris Matin to That Effect.

Paris, July 19 .- The Matin yesterday morning published a statement by Count Ferdinand Walsin Esterhazy, in which he says that he wrote the borderean by order of Colonel Sandherr, and that it was sent to the house of Colonel Schwartzkoppen, then military attache at the German embassy in Paris, whence it was returned to the War Office. Colonel Schwartzkoppen, being at the time in Berlin, never saw the bordereau, which was forged in order to supply material proof of the guilt of Dreyfus.

that secret agents in Berlin, whose testimony it was impossible to use, had demonstrated that leakages had occurred in the War Office, and the fact that treason existed was undeniable and everything indicated Dreyfus as the traitor.

HON. C. A. GEOFFRION DEAD.

An Able Lawyer and Minister in the Laurier Cabinet Passes Away-Sketch of His Career.

Montreal, July 19 .- The Hon. C. A. Geoffrion, Minister without portfolio in the Laurier Ministry, died at his summer residence, Dorionville, Que., at an early hour yesterday morning. Sketch of His Career.

The late Hon. C. A. Geoffrion was born at Varennes in 1843, and was educated at St. Hyacinthe, and afterwards at McGill University, where he received the degree of B.C.L. in 1866. He was called to the bar in the same year. In 1887 he was made a Q.C., and in 1891 he

received the degree of D.C.L. from Mc-Gill, where he has been for many years professor of civil law. In 1870 he married a daughter of the late Chief Justice Sir A. A. Dorion. His brother, the late Hon. Felix Geoffrion, for many years member for Vercheres, was in the Mackenzie Government, and was one of the ablest men in the province. On his death the nomination in Vercheres was offered to Mr. C. A. Geoffrion, who yielded to the request of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and was elected in April, 1895.

In the election of 1896 the County of Vercheres was united to Chambly, and Mr. Geoffrion had for opponent Hon. L. O. Taillon, the late Premier of the province and the local member for Chambly, but was re-elected. His position in the Province of Quebec entitled him to a seat in the Cabinet, but his previous objections to political life con- turn.
