PROHIBITION CRITICISED

Rev. Dr. Rainsford Says it is Wrong in Principle

Rev. Dr. Rainsford of New York, was once a Toronto clergyman, but is now one of the most vigorous preachers of radical reforms in the American metropolis. Of the prohibition of the liquor traffic Dr. Rainsford says:—"The whole principle is wrong. The business of the church is to educate people to the need of higher laws; to raise the standards of moral obligation step by step. When religious statutes legal enactment and penal statutes in place of persuasion, it is going back to the principles of Cromwell, of Philip of Spain and of the Puritans."

"This is trying to do Christ's work with the sword instead of the cross. This spirit has led to unfair and discriminating laws of class and against class. So long as it does not hurt the social position of a man to bet on the Suburban or the Brooklyn Handicap, policy shops and gambling houses will flourish in New York."

"One of the greatest dangers in the United States is the passing of laws and leaving them to carry out themselves. I would to God all the saloons could be closed and kept closed, but until something better is provided it is trusting temperance in the background to attempt to close them when a large number of people wish them open."

"There is no danger of our becoming a nation of drunkards. There is a greater danger of our learning contempt for our laws. . . ."

"Any series of prohibitive laws put a whip in the hand of the blackmailer. The ultimate solution will come through cutting the nerve of the traffic by making profits impossible. The attempted enforcement of Sunday closing laws makes liars and lawbreakers of the people and fattens blackmail in a city where today the police are going their own gait."
