BIG ANIMAL CIRCUS.

THE ORANGEMEN CELEBRATED KING WILLIAM'S BIG VICTORY

A Successful Demonstration Was Held Here on the Twelfth.

DECORATION AND PARADE

Over 2000 Members of the Order Marched to the Sound of Music.

Never did the town present a more 43c gala appearance nor welcome a big-20 ger crowd than on Saturday last, the 550 Twelfth of July. From the Britton 50 block to beyond the market Kent 5c street's broad expanse was spanned by mottoed streamers interspersed by multitudinous flags and bunting in many colors and designs. The store fronts bore heavy flags and lighter 5c decorations, and when swept by the breeze, the main thoroughfare was gay and animated enough to have harmonized well with no mean cor-

onation parade. SC Early in the day, which was fine 1c and warm, the crowd began to assemble. On every boat and train they came. Regulars with extra coaches and specials from all direc-100 tions were burdened to standing 4c room. Soon the sound of fife and drum announced what day it was, 35c and this sound multiplied until amid and above all gayety, the marching 25c and the sight-seeing arose the strains 980 that for more than two centuries \$1 40 have been the accompaniment of the 80c Orange parade. A few brass bands provided acceptable reinforcements.

65C No more orderly crowd than that 1 25 of Saturday ever came to Lindsay. There was a good deal of drinking done but very few people appeared the worse of liquor and only one arrest was made. There was a spirit of cordiality and good nature abroad that robbed the occasion of much of the unpleasantness that sectarian demonstrations are apt to create.

The whole forenoon was given up to welcoming the visiting lodges. As they came trooping in with banners and music they were watched with interest by the crowds that lined the streets and who by sight-seeing and renewing acquaintance amused themselves till dinner time.

In the afternoon the townspeople were on the street in large numbers and greatly augmented the forenoon's crowd. For an hour the many lodges were mustering. About 3 o'clock the parade began. At its head rode County Master Cottingham of Omemee, Past District Master Vallace Mr. W. Warren of town, Mr. G. Hall of Peterboro and District Master T. Downey. In the first carriage rode Past County Master T. Stephenson of Omemee, Past Grand Master John Kelly town, and Past Grand Master Weir of Peterboro. In the second carriage were Mr. W.
